Rifle and Craig Substation Modifications and Approach Spans Re-Conductoring Garfield County, Rifle, Colorado and Moffat County, Craig, Colorado

<u>Brief Description of Proposal</u>: Western Area Power Administration (Western) proposes to modify Rifle and Craig Substations. The modifications would occur both within and outside the fenced perimeter at the Rifle substation (owned and operated by Western), Garfield County, and the Craig substation (owned and operated by Tri-State Generation and Transmission Association, Inc.), Moffat County, Colorado.

Western would replace Disconnect Switches 380, 381, 383, 483, and 485 and Power Circuit Breakers 382 and 486 at the Rifle substation.

The approach spans from the Rifle take off structure (TOS) through structure 80/7A will be reconductored. These structures extend approximately 2500 feet to the northeast of the Rifle substation on the Craig-Rifle transmission line.

The approach spans from the Craig TOS through structure 1/0 will be reconductored. These structures extend approximately 300 feet north of the Craig Substation on the Craig-Rifle transmission line.

A. <u>Number and Title of the Categorical Exclusion Being Applied</u>: (See text in 10 CFR Part 1021, Subpart D.)

B4.6. Additions and modifications to transmission facilities

Additions or modifications to electric power transmission facilities within a previously disturbed or developed facility area. Covered activities include, but are not limited to, switchyard rock grounding upgrades, secondary containment projects, paving projects, seismic upgrading, tower modifications, load-shaping projects (such as the installation and use of flywheels and battery arrays), changing insulators, and replacement of poles, circuit breakers, conductors, transformers, and crossarms.

B4.13 Upgrading and rebuilding existing powerlines

Upgrading or rebuilding approximately 20 miles in length or less and/or minor relocation of existing electric powerlines, which may involve minor relocations of small segments of the powerlines.

- B. <u>Regulatory Requirements in 10 CFR 1021.410 (b)</u>: (See full text in regulation and attached checklist.)
 - 1) The proposed action fits within a class of actions listed in Appendix B.

For classes of actions listed in Appendix B, the following conditions are integral elements. To fit within a class, the proposal <u>must not</u>:

- Threaten a violation of applicable statutory, regulatory, or permit requirements for environment, safety, and health, or similar requirements of DOE or Executive Orders;
- Require siting and construction or major expansion of waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment facilities (including incinerators), but the proposal may include categorically excluded waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment actions or facilities;

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- Disturb hazardous substances, pollutants, contaminants, or CERCLA-excluded petroleum and natural gas products that preexist in the environment such that there would be uncontrolled or unpermitted releases;
- Have the potential to cause significant impacts on environmentally sensitive resources. An environmentally sensitive resource is typically a resource that has been identified as needing protection through Executive Order, statute, or regulation by Federal, State, or local government, or a federally recognized Indian tribe. An action may be categorically excluded if, although sensitive resources are present, the action would not have the potential to cause significant impacts on those resources (such as construction of a building with its foundation well above a sole-source aquifer or upland surface soil removal on a site that has wetlands). Environmentally sensitive resources include, but are not limited to; those listed in paragraph B. (4) (see Attachment A).
- 2) There are no extraordinary circumstances related to the proposal that may affect the significance of the environmental effects of the proposal.
- 3) The proposal is not "connected" to other actions with potentially significant impacts, is not related to other proposed actions with cumulatively significant impacts, and is not precluded by 40 CFR 1506.1 or 10 CFR 1021.211.

C. Special Stipulations Pertaining to the Proposal:

If the scope of work of this project changes, Western's Environmental Division must be contacted for additional environmental review.

The findings of this Categorical Exclusion depend on the contractor's execution of, or compliance with, Western's construction specifications for the project, specially, Division 13-Environmental Quality Protection.

This Categorical Exclusion is valid for 3 years after the signature date. If construction has not commenced within that time, Western's Environmental Division must be contacted for an updated environmental review prior to construction.

Western has a Programmatic Agreement (PA) with the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation, State Historic Preservation Offices, Federal Agencies and Tribes in Western's Rocky Mountain Region. The PA addresses impacts of routine maintenance of transmission lines, substations and other facilities on archaeological resources and specifically addresses cutting and dropping danger trees under Section I. Maintenance Activities with No or Minor Associated Surface Disturbance B(8). Provisions for avoidance of sensitive cultural resources require that all work within these areas be conducted by hand. Areas may only be accessed using rubber-tired vehicles.

If any cultural materials are discovered during construction, work in the area shall halt immediately, Western and the Colorado SHPO staff shall be contacted, and the material be evaluated by an archaeologist or historian meeting the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualification Standards (48 FR 22716, Sept. 1983).

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If re-conducting of the transmission line between Rifle substation TOS and structures 80/5A, 80/5B, 80/5, 80/6, and 80/7A occurs during the primary nesting season (April 1 to July 31), a qualified biologist should conduct a field survey of the affected habitat in Western's ROW to determine the absence or presence of nesting migratory birds. Nests in the project area during this time will be avoided.

If re-conducting of the transmission line between Craig substation TOS and structure 1/0 occurs during the primary nesting season (April 1 to July 31), a qualified biologist should conduct a field survey of the affected habitat in Western's ROW to determine the absence or presence of nesting migratory birds. Nests in the project area during this time will be avoided.

The contractor or Western will notify the landowner or appropriate agency before proceeding with work.

D. <u>Determination:</u> Based on my review of information provided to me and in my possession concerning the proposed action, I determined that the proposed action fits within the specified class of actions, the other regulatory requirements set forth above are met, and the proposed action is categorically excluded from requirements for an EA or an EIS.
