## Weld-Kersey West Tap Transmission Line Interconnect Project Weld County, Colorado

A. <u>Brief Description of Proposal</u>: Western Area Power Administration (Western) proposes to approve a new interconnect request to its Weld-Kersey West Tap (WLD-KRW) Transmission Line. On October 31, 2012, Public Service Company of Colorado (PSCo) requested an interconnection to Western's WLD-KRW Transmission Line near PSCo's Rosedale Substation. The interconnection will allow an additional electrical power source to be provided to the Greeley area. PSCo is an existing Western customer and this interconnection will be added to PSCo's Network Integration Transmission Service contract. No new power generation facilities will be constructed as a part of this project.

The WLD-KRW Transmission Line is a double circuit, 3 phase 115-kV transmission line constructed on steel pole structures from the Weld to Rosedale Substations. The double circuit line is owned and maintained by PSCo/Xcel. Western owns the right-of-way (ROW) and structures from Willowby to Rosedale and the circuit is constructed on wood-H structures.

The following modifications will be made to Western's WLD-KRW Transmission Line near PSCo's Rosedale Substation:

- 1. Remove one existing PSCo 115-kV steel pole structure;
- 2. Install three steel pole structures with foundation;
  - a. Two structures will be owned by PSCo
  - b. One structure, 14/5, will be owned by Western
- 3. Widen the existing ROW;
- 4. Install and commission meters and relays in the Rosedale Substation.

# B. <u>Number and Title of the Categorical Exclusion Being Applied</u>: (See text in 10 CFR Part 1021, Subpart D.)

#### **B4.11 Electric Power Substation and Interconnection Facilities.**

Construction or modification of electric power substations or interconnection facilities (including, but not limited to, switching stations and support facilities).

- C. <u>Regulatory Requirements in 10 CFR 1021.410 (b)</u>: (See full text in regulation and attached checklist.)
  - 1) The proposed action fits within a class of actions listed in Appendix A or B to Subpart D.

For classes of actions listed in Appendix B, the following conditions are integral elements. To fit within a class, the proposal <u>must not</u>:

- Threaten a violation of applicable statutory, regulatory, or permit requirements for environment, safety, and health, or similar requirements of DOE or Executive Orders;
- Require siting and construction or major expansion of waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment facilities (including incinerators), but the proposal may include categorically excluded waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment actions or facilities;

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- Disturb hazardous substances, pollutants, contaminants, or CERCLA-excluded petroleum and natural gas products that preexist in the environment such that there would be uncontrolled or unpermitted releases;
- Have the potential to cause significant impacts on environmentally sensitive resources. An environmentally sensitive resource is typically a resource that has been identified as needing protection through Executive Order, statute, or regulation by Federal, State, or local government, or a federally recognized Indian tribe. An action may be categorically excluded if, although sensitive resources are present, the action would not have the potential to cause significant impacts on those resources (such as construction of a building with its foundation well above a sole-source aquifer or upland surface soil removal on a site that has wetlands). Environmentally sensitive resources include, but are not limited to those listed in paragraph B. (4) (see Attachment A).
- 2) There are no extraordinary circumstances related to the proposal that may affect the significance of the environmental effects of the proposal.
- 3) The proposal is not "connected" to other actions with potentially significant impacts, is not related to other proposed actions with cumulatively significant impacts, and is not precluded by 40 CFR 1506.1 or 10 CFR 1021.211.

## D. Special Stipulations Pertaining to the Proposal:

This Categorical Exclusion (CX) is valid for one year after the signature date. If construction activities have not commenced within that time or the scope of the work changes, Western's Environmental Division must be contacted for an updated environmental review.

If any cultural materials are discovered during construction, work in the area shall halt immediately Western's Regional Preservation Officer shall be contacted, and the material evaluated by an archaeologist or historian meeting the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualification Standards (48 FR 22716, Sept. 1983).

All equipment used will be cleaned prior to use in the area to prevent transporting of invasive plant or noxious weed seeds.

To comply with the Migratory Bird Treaty Act, work authorized under this CX should be scheduled outside the March 1 through July 31 general nesting periods. If construction activities are to be done during this period, contact Western's Environmental Division so that they may arrange for a survey to be conducted in advance of the maintenance crews to identify active nests that are to be avoided.

Western shall exercise care to preserve the natural landscape and shall conduct this construction operation to prevent any unnecessary destruction, scarring, or defacing of the natural surroundings in the project vicinity. Except where clearing is required for permanent works, or excavation operations, vegetation shall be preserved and shall be protected from damage by construction operations and equipment.

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To minimize impacts to the environment and prevent damage to access roads, operation of off-road equipment will not be permitted during periods of heavy rains, when soils are wet, or when excessive soil damage may occur due to unsuitable operating conditions. No construction or routine maintenance activities shall be performed during periods when the soil is too wet to adequately support construction equipment. If equipment creates ruts in excess of six inches deep, the soil shall be deemed too wet to adequately support construction equipment.

Determination: Based on my review of information provided to me and in my possession concerning the proposed action, I determined that the proposed action fits within the specified class of actions, the other regulatory requirements set forth above are met, and the proposed action is categorically excluded from requirements for an EA or an EIS.
