BetterBuildings for Michigan RESIDENTIAL PROGRAM

FACTSHEET

- The BetterBuildings for Michigan residential program provides direct support—including home energy assessments, incentives and access to affordable loan options—to Michigan homeowners looking to make their homes more energy efficient.
- The residential program targets 27 neighborhoods in several regions in Michigan, including the the suburbs of southeast Michigan, the cities of Detroit, Grand Rapids, Wyandotte, Traverse City and Marquette, St. Joseph County and Bath and Dewitt Townships.
- The residential program will offer energy efficiency improvements to more than **11,340 homes** statewide.
- Selected neighborhoods must have strong neighborhood groups, synergy with local partners including utilities, foundations and community action agencies, and a high percentage of home ownership.
- Participating homeowners can expect to save hundreds on their utility bills while improving the comfort and value of their home.
- Participants will also be helping to make their communities healthier and more sustainable places to live.
- To market the program, partners, supporters and community members "sweep," or canvass between 400 and 1,200 homes in targeted neighborhoods to educate homeowners and offer the program's incentives.

- Energy assessments and home weatherization and efficiency measures will be offered to homeowners who express an interest for a small fee ranging from \$25 to \$150.
- Homeowners determine what additional energy efficiency measures make the most sense for their home and their budget. The energy assessment will provide them with a roadmap for making their home more energy efficient.
- Affordable, no-down-payment loans to finance improvements will be offered to homeowners through the Michigan Saves Home Energy Loan Program.
