takeaways:



- Leverage HVAC upgrades to spark conversations about wholehome performance. Customers, who have put their trust in a contractor to complete their HVAC repair, might welcome the contractor's expert efficiency advice.
- Residential energy efficiency customers have different backgrounds, needs, and motivations, which programs can use to tailor messages and services to different groups.
 EnergySavvy uses cloud software to pair utility data with marketing data and create individual utility customer profiles to target energy efficiency messages.

KeystoneHELP was originally launched in 2006 by energy efficiency lender and Residential Network member AFC First Financial Corporation, which is now a part of Renew Financial, as a pilot program that was expanded statewide. Approximately 14,000 homeowners were able to borrow up to \$15,000 for a range of home energy improvements during the last iteration of the program.

JUMP is an online crowdsourcing initiative aimed at advancing energy-efficient building technologies. JUMP issues calls for innovation to invite the public to present their ideas to market leaders in research and development.

Fannie Mae Offers a New Method for Homeowners to Finance Upgrades

Residential propertyassessed clean energy (PACE) programs have grown in recent years; now Fannie Mae is offering a new mortgage option that allows homeowners to finance energy upgrade costs up to 15% of the appraised value of their homes.



Fannie Mae's <u>HomeStyle Energy program</u> provides financing for solar photovoltaics, along with energy- and water-efficient upgrades, for single-family homes and multifamily homes of up to four units. The difference with Fannie Mae's program is that PACE is typically an assessment tied to the property's tax bill, whereas the HomeStyle
