ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW for CATEGORICAL EXCLUSION DETERMINATION Rocky Mountain Region, Western Area Power Administration

Weld Substation Transformer Placement, Greeley, Weld County, CO

A. <u>Brief Description of Proposal</u>: The Weld substation is located approximately two miles east of the town of Greeley, in Weld County, CO. Legal description is T5N, R66W, Section 5 with lat/long of 40.42701,-104.80740. Western will install; One – 150 MVA Transformer 230/115-kV (KV2A), Two - 230-kV Power Circuit Breaker, Four - 230-kV switches, One -115-kV Power Circuit Breaker, Three - 115-kV switches, and associated bus, meter, and control equipment. Western will also perform site work for the substation yard. The substation area where work will occur is approximately 800 feet by 600 feet and is entirely surrounded by cyclone fence. The station is a gravel parking lot with no vegetation except for the most northerly portion, an area of 200 feet long and 600 feet wide. Work and structures are planned to be contained on the graveled portion of the substation. All the work area has been previously disturbed ground and has grounding matting buried beneath it. The new transformer, circuit breakers, as well as overhead cable poles will be set on concrete foundations that are to be placed. Access will be via paved roadway through the fence gate into substation graveled yard. The developed yard has ample room for boom truck and other equipment needed for hauling and placing the transformer and other small structures. The transformer contains oil and the substation Spill Prevention, Control and Countermeasure Plan (SPPC) is being amended for the facility to accommodate the new transformer. The circuit breakers are gas filled and do not contain oil.

B. Number and Title of the Categorical Exclusion Being Applied: (See text in 10 CFR Part 1021, Subpart D Appendix B.)

B4.6. Additions or modifications to electrical power transmission facilities that would not affect the environment beyond the previously developed facility area including, but not limited to switchyard rock grounding upgrades, secondary containment projects, paving projects, seismic upgrading, tower modifications, changing insulators and replacement of poles, circuit breakers, conductors, transformers and crossarms.

If any cultural materials are discovered during construction, work in the area shall halt immediately, Western and the Wyoming SHPO staff shall be contacted, and the material be evaluated by an archaeologist or historian meeting the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualification Standards (48 FR 22716, Sept. 1983).

E. Determination: Based on my review of information provided to me and in my possession concerning the proposed action, I determined that the proposed action fits within the specified class of actions, the other regulatory requirements set forth above are met, and the proposed action is categorically excluded from requirements for an EA or an EIS.
