Bucknam Temporary Tap, Natrona County, Wyoming

A. <u>Brief Description of Proposal</u>: Western is entering into an agreement with Tri-State Generation and Transmission to provide a temporary tap with mobile equipment to be placed until a facility study can be done for permanent construction. This Categorical Exclusion is for the installation of a temporary mobile transformer within Western's right of way (ROW) easement on Bureau of Land Management land along the Casper-Arminto 115kV transmission line 50 feet north of structure 23/8. The project will require a temporary tap, pad location, temporary fencing around the transformer structure, and spill containment, control, and counter measures. There is existing access to the location and no road construction will be required. The temporary tap and transformer will be removed when no longer needed and the ROW restored to its previous condition.

B. <u>Number and Title of the Categorical Exclusion Being Applied</u>: (See text in 10 CFR Part 1021, Subpart D.)

B4.6. Additions or modifications to electric power transmission facilities within a previously disturbed or developed facility area. Covered activities include, but are not limited to, switchyard rock grounding upgrades, secondary containment projects, paving projects, seismic upgrading, tower modifications, load-shaping projects (such as the installation and use of flywheels and battery arrays), changing insulators, and replacement of poles, circuit breakers, conductors, transformers, and crossarms.

C. <u>Regulatory Requirements in 10 CFR 1021.410 (b)</u>: (See full text in regulation and attached checklist.)

1) The proposed action fits within a class of actions that is listed in Appendix A or B to Subpart D.

D. Special Stipulations Pertaining to the Proposal:

If the scope of work of this project changes you must contact Western's Environmental Division for additional environmental review.

If any cultural materials are discovered during construction, work in the area shall halt immediately, Western and the Wyoming SHPO staff shall be contacted, and the material be evaluated by an archaeologist or historian meeting the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualification Standards (48 FR 22716, Sept. 1983).

This CX is valid for 3 years after the signature date. If construction has not commenced within that time, contact Western's Environmental Division for an updated environmental review prior to construction.

Tri-State will implement its Spill Prevention, Control, and Countermeasures Plan for Mobile Transformers (November, 2007) during the project.

All work will be within Western's right of way easement.

E. Determination: Based on my review of information provided to me and in my possession concerning the proposed action, I determined that the proposed action fits within the specified class of actions, the other regulatory requirements set forth above are met, and the proposed action is categorically excluded from requirements for an EA or an EIS.
