Torrington-Wildcat 69-kV Transmission Line Rebuild Project, Goshen County, Wyoming

A. Brief Description of Proposal:

Western Area Power Administration (Western) proposes to replace three structures (19-4, 19-5, and 19-6) with three new structures on its existing Torrington-Wildcat 69-kilovolt (kV) transmission line in Goshen County, Wyoming. The action is undertaken at the request of the Wyoming Department of Transportation (WYDOT). Western's proposed action is a component of the larger WYDOT Torrington Urban Projects. The WYDOT project would realign, widen, and improve U.S. Highway (U.S.) 85, U.S. 26, and U.S. 26/85 in the southern part of the City of Torrington, WY. Western's action is necessary so WYDOT, as part of the Torrington Urban Project, can construct a bridge from U.S. Highway 26 over railroad tracks at East F Street and provide a minimum clearance of 30 feet between the new bridge and transmission line. The project area is located in a highly disturbed, urbanized area between cultivated agricultural lands, a railroad line, and U.S. 26. Western's proposed rebuild project is located within WYDOT's project footprint.

The three new transmission structures are taller and would replace three existing structures to raise the line to the requested height. The structures proposed to be replaced are located in Sec. 15, T. 24 N., R. 61W, of the 6th Principal Meridian in Goshen County, WY. The new structures would be placed within 10 feet of an existing structure. The alignment of the existing 69-kV transmission line will not change.

For additional information regarding the overall project, an Environmental Assessment (FHWA-WY-EA-07-01) titled *Torrington Urban Projects, U.S. 85 Realignment and U.S. 26 – U.S. 26/85 Reconstruction, Goshen County, Wyoming*, dated August 2007 was prepared by WYDOT for the Federal Highways Administration.

B. Number and Title of the Categorical Exclusion Being Applied: (See text in 10 CFR Part 1021, Subpart D.)

B4.13. Upgrading and rebuilding existing powerlines.

Upgrading or rebuilding approximately 20 miles in length or less of existing electric powerlines, which may involve minor relocations of small segments of the powerlines.

C. Regulatory Requirements in 10 CFR 1021.410 (b): (See full text in regulation and attached checklist.)

- 1) The proposed action fits within a class of actions listed in Appendix A or B to Subpart D.

For classes of actions listed in Appendix B, the following conditions are integral elements. To fit within a class, the proposal must not:

- Threaten a violation of applicable statutory, regulatory, or permit requirements for environment, safety, and health, or similar requirements of DOE or Executive Orders;
- Require siting and construction or major expansion of waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment facilities (including incinerators), but the proposal may include categorically excluded waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment actions or facilities;

- Disturb hazardous substances, pollutants, contaminants, or CERCLA-excluded petroleum and natural gas products that preexist in the environment such that there would be uncontrolled or unpermitted releases;
 - Have the potential to cause significant impacts on environmentally sensitive resources. An environmentally sensitive resource is typically a resource that has been identified as needing protection through Executive Order, statute, or regulation by Federal, State, or local government, or a federally recognized Indian tribe. An action may be categorically excluded if, although sensitive resources are present, the action would not have the potential to cause significant impacts on those resources (such as construction of a building with its foundation well above a sole-source aquifer or upland surface soil removal on a site that has wetlands). Environmentally sensitive resources include, but are not limited to, those listed in paragraph B. (4) (see Attachment A).
- 2) There are no extraordinary circumstances related to the proposal that may affect the significance of the environmental effects of the proposal.
- 3) The proposal is not "connected" to other actions with potentially significant impacts, is not related to other proposed actions with cumulatively significant impacts, and is not precluded by 40 CFR 1506.1 or 10 CFR 1021.211.

D. Special Stipulations Pertaining to the Proposal:

If the scope of work of this project changes, Western's Environmental Division must be contacted for additional environmental review.

This Categorical Exclusion is valid for 3 years after the signature date. If construction has not commenced within that time, Western's Environmental Division must be contacted for an updated environmental review prior to construction.

If any cultural materials are discovered during construction, work in the area shall halt immediately, Western and the Wyoming SHPO staff shall be contacted, and the material be evaluated by an archaeologist or historian meeting the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualification Standards (48 FR 22716, Sept. 1983).

- E. Determination:** Based on my review of information provided to me and in my possession concerning the proposed action, I determined that the proposed action fits within the specified class of actions, the other regulatory requirements set forth above are met, and the proposed action is categorically excluded from requirements for an EA or an EIS.
