Proposed Action Title: Outgrant to Southwest Gas for an underground natural gas distribution pipeline at Coolidge Substation

Program or Field Office: Western Area Power Administration/ Desert Southwest Region

Location(s) (City/County/State): Coolidge, Pinal County, Arizona

Proposed Action Description:

Western proposes to issue an outgrant easement to Southwest Gas Corporation for the construction, operation, and maintenance of an underground natural gas distribution pipeline that crosses Western's Coolidge Substation located at 2288 North Arizona Boulevard, Coolidge, Pinal County, Arizona. Western owns the substation property in fee. The outgrant covers approximately 0.29 acres and measures 10 feet wide by 1288 feet long (0.25 mile). It occurs within a portion of the northeast quarter of the southeast quarter of Section 9 in Township 5 South, Range 8 East on the Gila and Salt River Baseline and Meridian.

Southwest Gas applied to Western for an outgrant, because the existing pipeline, which also crosses the substation property, requires replacement based on age (it was built in 1952) and integrity studies. The line, which overall is 0.75-mile-long, serves six customers situated west of the substation.

Southwest Gas plans to abandon in-place an existing underground steel natural gas pipeline and install a new 2-inch-diameter polyethylene one. They propose to dig a 1-foot-wide, 4-to-5-foot-deep trench using a backhoe or trencher. Workers will drive construction equipment on the existing dirt road (i.e., Silverhawk/ Clark Farm Rd) and park on the shoulder. Pipe connections may be butt welded or heat fused. They plan to bore under Arizona Boulevard and any other surface obstructions. A staging area may be located on private land located west of the substation. No road or lane closures are planned. They plan to start work in February 2014, and construction is expected to occur intermittently over 30 days. SEE CONTINUATION SHEET


