Proposed Action Title: Nogales Substation Temporary Laydown Yard

Program or Field Office: Western Area Power Administration, Desert Southwest Region

Location(s) (City/County/State): Pima County, Arizona

Proposed Action Description:

Western Area Power Administration (Western) proposes to use a temporary staging and laydown yard adjacent to Nogales Substation in Pima County, Arizona (Figures 1 and 2). The project area is located within Western's existing easement on lands administered by the Bureau of Land Management in Township 16 South, Range 15 East, Section 7 (Gila and Salt River Baseline and Meridian). The purpose of the project is to provide a temporary staging and laydown yard for project vehicles and equipment being used for the Tucson-Apache (TUC-APE) 115-kV Transmission Line Wood Pole Replacement Project in Pima and Cochise counties, Arizona; a separate Categorical Exclusion was completed for the wood pole project in February 2013. The laydown yard measures about 200 feet by 175 feet (Figure 2, Option B), and is located adjacent to the east fence of the existing Nogales Substation. Access to the laydown yard is from Wilmot Road via an existing dirt road around the south perimeter of Nogales Substation. The laydown yard will be cleared to provide a smooth and level surface for storage. An above-ground fence system will be installed around the perimeter of the laydown yard for security. The temporary staging and laydown area is anticipated to be in use beginning March 29 for about one month.

Special Condition:

1. A Biological Monitor shall conduct a pre-construction survey for Pima pineapple cactus, desert tortoise, and nesting birds no more than 2 days prior to project activities.
