ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW FOR CATEGORICAL EXCLUSION DETERMINATION

Rocky Mountain Region, Western Area Power Administration

Buffalo Pass Communications Building Replacement Routt County, Colorado

- A. <u>Brief Description of Proposal</u>: Western Area Power Administration (Western) proposes to replace its Buffalo Pass Communications Site building and remove the existing deteriorating building. The existing fiberglass shell building is beyond its expected lifespan and is succumbing to heavy snow loads that are common to the site. The building and access roads are located approximately 6.8 miles east of Steamboat Springs, Colorado, on lands managed by the Hahn's Peak-Bears Ears Ranger District of the Routt National Forest. As part of the project, Western may conduct minor maintenance on the existing one-half mile long gravel access road that extends from Forest Road 310 to the project site. This maintenance may be needed to allow access for larger trucks to remove and install the infrastructure. In addition, a 200-foot segment of gravel road will be constructed at the new building location to provide access and parking. The new building will be constructed on a poured concrete pad upon which four 6- by 12-foot concrete prefabricated walls will be placed and roofed. The structure is planned to be constructed in the 2014 field season. The existing building may not be removed until the 2015 field season, after construction of the new building. The existing building is pre-fabricated fiberglass construction and will be transported offsite, on a vehicle. The existing communications building's concrete pad will be demolished, removed, and the area reseeded. A short two-track road leads from the existing parking area and accesses a portion of the Continental Divide Trail approximately 600 feet from the communications site. The two-track road is not affiliated with the communications site, however the USDA Forest Service has requested that Western decommission this road segment during the construction process and Western has agreed to oblige this request.
- B. Number and Title of the Categorical Exclusion Being Applied: (See text in 10 CFR Part 1021, Subpart D.)

B1.19 Microwave, Meteorological, and Radio Towers.

Siting, **construction**, modification, operation, **and removal of** microwave, radio communication, and meteorological towers and **associated facilities**, provided that the towers and associated facilities would not be in a governmentally designated scenic area (see B(4)(iv) of this appendix) unless otherwise authorized by the appropriate governmental entity.

- C. <u>Regulatory Requirements in 10 CFR 1021.410 (b)</u>: (See full text in regulation and attached checklist.)
 - 1) The proposed action fits within a class of actions listed in Appendix A or B to Subpart D.

For classes of actions listed in Appendix B, the following conditions are integral elements. To fit within a class, the proposal must not:

- Threaten a violation of applicable statutory, regulatory, or permit requirements for environment, safety, and health, or similar requirements of DOE or Executive Orders;
- Require siting and construction or major expansion of waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment facilities (including incinerators), but the proposal may include categorically excluded waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment actions or facilities;

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- Disturb hazardous substances, pollutants, contaminants, or CERCLA-excluded petroleum and natural gas products that preexist in the environment such that there would be uncontrolled or unpermitted releases;
- Have the potential to cause significant impacts on environmentally sensitive resources. An environmentally sensitive resource is typically a resource that has been identified as needing protection through Executive Order, statute, or regulation by Federal, State, or local government, or a federally recognized Indian tribe. An action may be categorically excluded if, although sensitive resources are present, the action would not have the potential to cause significant impacts on those resources (such as construction of a building with its foundation well above a sole-source aquifer or upland surface soil removal on a site that has wetlands). Environmentally sensitive resources include, but are not limited to, those listed in paragraph B. (4) (see Attachment A).
- 2) There are no extraordinary circumstances related to the proposal that may affect the significance of the environmental effects of the proposal.
- 3) The proposal is not "connected" to other actions with potentially significant impacts, is not related to other proposed actions with cumulatively significant impacts, and is not precluded by 40 CFR 1506.1 or 10 CFR 1021.211.

D. Special Stipulations Pertaining to the Proposal:

If the scope of work of this project changes, Western's Environmental Division must be contacted for additional environmental review.

This Categorical Exclusion is valid for the 2014-15 field seasons after the signature date. If construction has not commenced within that time, Western's Environmental Division must be contacted for an updated environmental review prior to construction.

If any cultural materials are discovered during construction, work in the area shall halt immediately, Western's Regional Preservation Officer shall be contacted, and the material evaluated by an archaeologist or historian meeting the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualification Standards (48 FR 22716, Sept. 1983).

All equipment used must be cleaned prior to use in order to prevent transporting of invasive plant or noxious weed seeds.

To comply with the Migratory Bird Treaty Act, maintenance work should be scheduled outside the March 1 through July 31 general nesting periods. If the maintenance work is to be done during this period contact Western's Environmental Division so that they may arrange for a pedestrian survey to be conducted in advance of the maintenance crews to identify active nests that are to be avoided.

Western shall exercise care to preserve the natural landscape and shall conduct this construction operation to prevent any unnecessary destruction, scarring, or defacing of the natural surroundings in the project vicinity. Except where clearing is required for permanent works, approved construction

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roads, or excavation operations, vegetation shall be preserved and shall be protected from damage by Western's construction operations and equipment.

To minimize impacts to potentially buried cultural resources and prevent damage to access roads, operation of off-road equipment will not be permitted during periods of heavy rains, when soils are wet, or when excessive soil damage may occur due to unsuitable operating conditions. No construction or routine maintenance activities shall be performed during periods when the soil is too wet to adequately support construction equipment. If equipment creates ruts in excess of 6 inches deep, the soil shall be deemed too wet to adequately support construction equipment.

E. <u>Determination:</u> Based on my review of information provided to me and in my possession concerning the proposed action, I determined that the proposed action fits within the specified class of actions, the other regulatory requirements set forth above are met, and the proposed action is categorically excluded from requirements for an EA or an EIS.
