Proposed Action Title: Prescott Pinnacle Peak Structure 147/4 - Replace and Upgrade Commercial Cellular Antenna for Verizon "Site AZ2 Hwy

Program or Field Office: Western Area Power Administration/ Desert Southwest Region (Western)

Location(s) (City/County/State): Prescott, Yavapai County, AZ

Proposed Action Description:

Western plans to replace and upgrade Verizon's commercial cellular antennae on Structure 147/4 along the Prescott Pinnacle Peak Transmission Line at 5095 East Ramada Drive, Prescott, Yavapai County, Arizona. It occurs on land owned by Diamond Valley Water District in portions of Section 28 in Township 14 North, Range 1 West on the Gila and Salt River Baseline and Meridian. The surrounding land use is residential.

Western's action entails removing 2 existing decommissioned antennae, installing 6 new antenna approximately 55 feet above ground surface, centered on the south and north sides, removing 4 coax cables, installing, 12 coax cables, and performing monthly maintenance on the antenna. Western would use a bucket truck, crane and crew trucks to accomplish the work. Existing access roads will be used; no road improvements are planned. The work is expect to take 2 days to complete. A schedule has not been set.

Verizon plans to upgrade and operate a commercial cellular site with antennae located on Western's structure. Verizon's action entails acquiring a lease from the landowner, installing a prefab equipment shelter measuring 12 by 20 feet on the south side of tower, connecting equipment to the coax on the tower, erecting a concrete-block wall around the shelter, and operating the cell site.
