Happy Jack 230-kV Substation Fiber Optic Installation Laramie County, Wyoming Project No. 2015-094 (Amended)

Brief Description of Proposal: Western Area Power Administration (Western) proposes to bury new conduit for a fiber optic cable at the Happy Jack Substation in Laramie County, Wyoming. The Happy Jack Substation is located in Section 5, Township 13 North, Range 67 West, of the 6th Principal Meridian. The substation is a graveled yard surrounded by a chain-link perimeter fence. The installation requires approximately 50-feet of trenching within Western's Happy Jack Substation fenced perimeter and approximately 450-feet of trenching, due east along the Cheyenne to Snowy Range 230-kV Transmission Line right-of-way (ROW) to Structure 5-5. The trench will be approximately 6-8 inches-wide and 2-feet-deep. A pickup truck and Ditch Witch RT-45 trencher will be used to dig and fill the trench, and minor back filling will be done with the trencher blade. All trench work will be conducted within a construction corridor footprint of approximately 40-feet wide. Western crews will install conduit within the trench and up the transmission pole. Fiber optic line will be fed into the new conduit to the fiber optic cable access point.

This Categorical Exclusion (CX) amends the original CX issued on May 6, 2015. The original CX expired at the end of calendar year 2015. However, not all of the proposed work was completed before the CX expired. The new conduit for the fiber optic cable at the Happy Jack Substation has been installed. Western crews still need to install the cable inside of the conduit. This work is proposed for 2016. Therefore, this CX covers the work that will be completed in 2016.

A. <u>Number and Title of the Categorical Exclusion Being Applied</u>: (See text in 10 CFR Part 1021, Subpart D.)

B4.7 Fiber Optic Cable:

Adding fiber optic cables to transmission facilities or burying fiber optic cable in existing powerline or pipeline rights-of-way. Covered actions may include associated vaults and pulling and tensioning sites outside of rights-of-way in nearby previously disturbed or developed areas.

 - 1) The proposed action fits within a class of actions listed in Appendix A or B to Subpart D.

For classes of actions listed in Appendix B, the following conditions are integral elements. To fit within a class, the proposal <u>must not</u>:

- Threaten a violation of applicable statutory, regulatory, or permit requirements for environment, safety, and health, or similar requirements of DOE or Executive Orders;
- Require siting and construction or major expansion of waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment facilities (including incinerators), but the proposal may include categorically excluded waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment actions or facilities;

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- Disturb hazardous substances, pollutants, contaminants, or CERCLA-excluded petroleum and natural gas products that preexist in the environment such that there would be uncontrolled or unpermitted releases;
- Have the potential to cause significant impacts on environmentally sensitive resources. An environmentally sensitive resource is typically a resource that has been identified as needing protection through Executive Order, statute, or regulation by Federal, State, or local government, or a federally recognized Indian tribe. An action may be categorically excluded if, although sensitive resources are present, the action would not have the potential to cause significant impacts on those resources (such as construction of a building with its foundation well above a sole-source aquifer or upland surface soil removal on a site that has wetlands). Environmentally sensitive resources include, but are not limited to; those listed in paragraph B. (4) (see Attachment A).
- 2) There are no extraordinary circumstances related to the proposal that may affect the significance of the environmental effects of the proposal.
- 3) The proposal is not "connected" to other actions with potentially significant impacts, is not related to other proposed actions with cumulatively significant impacts, and is not precluded by 40 CFR 1506.1 or 10 CFR 1021.211.

C. Special Stipulations Pertaining to the Proposal:

If the scope of work of this project changes, Western's Environmental Division must be contacted for additional environmental review.

This CX expires on December 31, 2016. If all project work has not been completed by the expiration date, or if need for an environmental compliance extension is anticipated, Western's Environmental Division must be contacted for an updated environmental review.

All work will be conducted using existing access roads and ROW. Minor access road maintenance may be required. Maintenance crews will ensure that all work remains within the 40-foot maximum construction corridor footprint.

Maintenance crews shall use special care to avoid areas immediately southeast and northwest of the substation identified as freshwater emergent wetland and known environmentally sensitive resources. Sensitive areas have been identified on maps that will be provided to construction crews prior to commencing any ground disturbing activity.

Western shall exercise care to preserve the natural landscape and shall conduct this construction operation to prevent any unnecessary destruction, scarring, or defacing of the natural surroundings in the project vicinity. Except where clearing is required for permanent works, approved construction roads, or excavation operations, vegetation shall be preserved and shall be protected from damage by Western's construction operations and equipment.

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If any cultural materials are discovered during construction, work in the area shall halt immediately, Western's Preservation Officer shall be contacted, and the material be evaluated by an archaeologist or historian meeting the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualification Standards (48 FR 22716, Sept. 1983). Work in the vicinity of the find may not resume until it has been inspected, evaluated, and all appropriate parties have been consulted.

E. <u>Determination</u>: Based on my review of information provided to me and in my possession concerning the proposed action, I have determined that the proposed action fits within the specified class of actions, the other regulatory requirements set forth above are met, and the proposed action is categorically excluded from requirements for an EA or an EIS.
