#### Canon West-Midway 230-kV Transmission Line Fiber Optic Addition Fremont County, Colorado Project No. 2016-002

- A. <u>Brief Description of Proposal</u>: Western Area Power Administration (Western) proposes to install a 48-count overhead fiber optic ground wire (OPGW) on Western's existing Canon West - Midway 230-kV (CCW-MID) Transmission Line, located in Fremont County, Colorado. This will be a joint project between Tri-State Generation and Transmission Association, Inc. and Western. Each party will be entitled to 24 fibers on the OPGW line. In 2015, most of the OPGW was installed from CCW Substation to the MID Substation, however one small segment could not be completed due to raptor nesting issues. Western's personnel plan to replace the existing single overhead ground wire (OGW) with OPGW in the segment from Structures 139/2 to 147/3 that could not be completed in 2015. Splicing of the OPGW to the 2015 installed segments of OPGW will be required at Structures 139/2 and 147/3, both of these structures are near the town of Penrose, Colorado. Splicing in this segment of the OPGW line will unite and complete the installation of OPGW on the remainder of the transmission line that was accomplished in 2015. In addition to changing the cable out, crews would install/replace proper hardware assemblies on existing structures. The type of equipment to be utilized is a spool trailer, pickup, bucket-truck, and possibly a helicopter. All equipment utilized would be rubbertired vehicles. All work would be confined to Western's right-of-way (ROW) easement. Existing access would be used and no new roads are proposed. Work is scheduled to start in February of 2016.
- B. <u>Number and Title of the Categorical Exclusion Being Applied</u>: (See text in 10 CFR Part 1021, Subpart D.)

#### **B4.7** Fiber Optic Cable.

Adding fiber optic cables to transmission facilities or burying fiber optic cable in existing powerline or pipeline rights-of-way. Covered actions may include associated vaults and pulling and tensioning sites outside of rights-of-way in nearby previously disturbed or developed areas.

- C. <u>Regulatory Requirements in 10 CFR 1021.410 (b)</u>: (See full text in regulation and attached checklist.)
  - 1) The proposed action fits within a class of actions listed in Appendix A or B to Subpart D.

For classes of actions listed in Appendix B, the following conditions are integral elements. To fit within a class, the proposal <u>must not</u>:

- Threaten a violation of applicable statutory, regulatory, or permit requirements for environment, safety, and health, or similar requirements of DOE or Executive Orders;
- Require siting and construction or major expansion of waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment facilities (including incinerators), but the proposal may include categorically excluded waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment actions or facilities;
- Disturb hazardous substances, pollutants, contaminants, or CERCLA-excluded petroleum and natural gas products that preexist in the environment such that there would be uncontrolled or unpermitted releases;

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- Have the potential to cause significant impacts on environmentally sensitive resources. An environmentally sensitive resource is typically a resource that has been identified as needing protection through Executive Order, statute, or regulation by Federal, State, or local government, or a federally recognized Indian tribe. An action may be categorically excluded if, although sensitive resources are present, the action would not have the potential to cause significant impacts on those resources (such as construction of a building with its foundation well above a sole-source aquifer or upland surface soil removal on a site that has wetlands). Environmentally sensitive resources include, but are not limited to, those listed in paragraph B. (4) (see Attachment A).
- 2) There are no extraordinary circumstances related to the proposal that may affect the significance of the environmental effects of the proposal.
- 3) The proposal is not "connected" to other actions with potentially significant impacts, is not related to other proposed actions with cumulatively significant impacts, and is not precluded by 40 CFR 1506.1 or 10 CFR 1021.211.

#### D. Special Stipulations Pertaining to the Proposal:

If the scope of work of this project changes, Western's Environmental Division must be contacted for additional environmental review.

This CX expires on December 31, 2016. If all project work has not been completed by the expiration date, or if need for an environmental compliance extension is anticipated, Western's Environmental Division must be contacted for an updated environmental review.

If any cultural materials are discovered during construction, work in the area shall halt immediately, Western's Preservation Officer shall be contacted, and the material be evaluated by an archaeologist or historian meeting the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualification Standards (48 FR 22716, Sept. 1983). Work in the vicinity of the find may not resume until it has been inspected, evaluated, and all appropriate parties have been consulted.

The movement of construction crews and equipment within the maintenance corridor, including access routes, shall be limited to minimize damage beyond the ROW corridor. Maintenance activities shall be conducted to minimize scarring or defacing of the natural surroundings in the vicinity of the work. Except where terrain damage results from trenching activity, terrain and vegetation shall be preserved and protected from damage by maintenance crew operations and equipment. If operations or equipment causes terrain damage, the maintenance crew shall repair the damage.

To comply with the Migratory Bird Treaty Act, maintenance work should be scheduled outside the March 1 through July 31 general nesting period. If the maintenance work must be done during the general nesting period, contact Western's Environmental Division to arrange for a pedestrian

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survey. Surveys must be conducted in advance of the maintenance crews to identify active nests that are to be avoided.

Western has a clean vehicle policy and all equipment used must be cleaned prior to use in order to prevent transportation of invasive plant or noxious weed seeds. Operators will be required to wash all machinery (trailers, trucks, UTVs, etc.) before entering the action area and working on the project to prevent transport of non-native invasive species.

**E.** <u>Determination:</u> Based on my review of information provided to me and in my possession concerning the proposed action, I have determined that the proposed action fits within the specified class of actions, the other regulatory requirements set forth above are met, and the proposed action is categorically excluded from requirements for an EA or an EIS.
