Based on my review of the information concerning the proposed action, as NEPA Compliance Officer (authorized under DOE Order 451.1A), I have made the following determination:

Covered actions include, but are not limited to weatherization (such as insulation and replacing windows and doors); programmed lowering of thermostat settings; placement of timers on hot water heaters; installation or replacement of energy efficient lighting, low-flow plumbing fixtures (such as faucets, toilets, and showerheads), heating, ventilation, and air conditioning systems, and appliances; installation of drip-irrigation systems; improvements in generator efficiency and appliance efficiency ratings; efficiency improvements for vehicles and transportation (such as fleet changeout); power storage (such as flywheels and batteries, generally less than 10 megawatt equivalent); transportation management systems (such as traffic signal control systems, car navigation, speed cameras, and automatic plate number recognition); development of energy-efficient manufacturing, industrial, or building practices; and small-scale energy efficiency and conservation research and development and small-scale pilot projects. Covered actions include building renovations or new structures, provided that they occur in a previously disturbed or developed area. Covered actions could involve commercial, residential, agricultural, academic, institutional, or industrial sectors. Covered actions do not include rulemakings, standard-settings, or proposed DOE legislation, except for those actions listed in B5.1(b) of this appendix. ## Rationale for determination:

Koyukuk Native Village would utilize DOE and cost share funds to weatherize and improve the energy efficiency of the Koyukuk City Office Building located at 300 Vista Road. Koyukuk, Alaska. There would be no change in the use, mission or operation of the facility.

The City Office Building was built in 1981. There are no historic preservation issues and no hazardous or toxic materials are expected to be encountered. The foundation of the building would be leveled so doors and windows fit correctly. The exterior envelope of the building would be sealed by furring it out, adding insulation and a vapor barrier and re-siding it while replacing all doors and windows. The ceiling would be reinforced and cellulose insulation would be blown into the roof cavity. Lighting fixtures would be upgraded to LED lights. A new boiler and baseboard heat would replace an inefficient furnace and ineffective air vents that blow hot air down from the ceiling to the first floor. A new woodstove, hearth and stack would replace an old wood stove. The existing floor would be replaced with air-tight durable composite laminate flooring. Progress and financial status of the project would be documented in quarterly reports.

Waste created by the project activities are expected to be minimal and would include standard demolition and construction materials such as previously installed doors and windows, as well as the discarded packaging for the new materials to be installed during the weatherization retrofit. There is no asbestos or otherwise toxic material slated for disposal. All discarded and scrap materials from the demolition or new installation would be hauled to and disposed of at the Koyukuk landfill. The Koyukuk landfill is permitted for the disposal of construction and demolition wastes with the State of Alaska (Permit No. SW3A028-18). No additional permitting is required for the proposed activities.

Based on review of the project information, DOE has determined that the project activities would not have a significant individual or cumulative impact to human health and/or environment. DOE has determined that these activities are consistent with actions contained in DOE categorical exclusions A9 "Information gathering, analysis, and dissemination," and B5.1 "Actions to conserve energy or water," and is categorically excluded from further NEPA
