Proposed Action Title: Supplemental Proposed Rulemaking for Energy Conservation Standards for Residential Furnaces (RIN: 1904-AD20)

Program or Field Office: EERE- Buildings Technology Program

Proposed Action Description:

In this Supplemental Proposed Rulemaking, the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) proposes energy conservation standards for residential furnaces. This proposed rulemaking only applies to residential non-weatherized gas furnaces and mobile home gas furnaces. These proposed standards, if adopted, would apply to all products listed in Table I.1 and Table I.2 of the Supplemental Notice of Proposed Rule, and manufactured in, or imported into, the United States on or after the date 5 years after the publication of the final rule for this rulemaking.

It is anticipated that the proposed rulemaking would result in cumulative emission reductions in the project area (that is across the United States), over a 30 year period, of 143 million metric tons (Mt) of carbon dioxide (CO₂), 687 thousand tons of nitrogen oxides (NO_x), and 2,777 thousand tons of methane (CH₄). It is also anticipated that the proposed rulemaking, due to projected switching from non-weatherized gas furnaces to electric heat pumps and electric furnaces, would result in emission increases of 76.8 thousand tons of sulfur dioxide (SO₂), 1.07 thousand tons of nitrous oxide (N₂O), and 0.3 tons of mercury (Hg). DOE has analyzed these increases and has determined that the increases are not significant and would not have a significant impact on human health or the environment.

DOE has determined that the proposed rulemaking is appropriate for a Categorical Exclusion under B5.1(b) as the proposed rulemaking establishes energy conservation standards and none of the exclusions of that section apply. Specifically, the proposed rulemaking would not: (1) have the potential to cause a significant change in manufacturing infrastructure and specifically in the manufacturing infrastructure for residential furnaces; (2) involve significant unresolved conflict concerning uses of available resources; (3) have the potential to result in a significant increase of materials posing significant risk to human health; and, (4) have the potential to cause a significant increase in energy consumption in a state or region.

This proposal is not connected to other actions with potentially significant impacts (40 CFR 1508.25(a)(1)), is not related to other actions with individually insignificant but cumulatively significant impacts (40 CFR 1508.27(b)(7)), and is not precluded by 40 CFR 1506.1 or 10 CFR 1021.211 concerning limitations on actions during preparation of an environmental impact statement.

Based on my review of the proposed action, as NEPA Compliance Officer (as authorized under DOE Order 451.1B), I have determined that the proposed action fits within the specified class(es) of action, the other regulatory requirements set forth above are met, and the proposed action is hereby categorically excluded from further NEPA review.
