Covered actions include, but are not limited to weatherization (such as insulation and replacing windows and doors); programmed lowering of thermostat settings; placement of timers on hot water heaters; installation or replacement of energy efficient lighting, low-flow plumbing fixtures (such as faucets, toilets, and showerheads), heating, ventilation, and air conditioning systems, and appliances; installation of drip-irrigation systems; improvements in generator efficiency and appliance efficiency ratings; efficiency improvements for vehicles and transportation (such as fleet changeout); power storage (such as flywheels and batteries, generally less than 10 megawatt equivalent), transportation management systems (such as traffic signal control systems, car navigation, speed cameras, and automatic plate number recognition); development of energy-efficient manufacturing, industrial, or building practices; and small-scale energy efficiency and conservation research and development and small-scale pilot projects. Covered actions include building renovations or new structures, provided that they occur in a previously disturbed or developed area. Covered actions could involve commercial, residential, agricultural, academic, institutional, or industrial sectors. Covered actions do not include rulemakings, standard-settings, or proposed DOE legislation, except for those actions listed in B5.1(b) of this appendix. (b) Covered actions include rulemakings that establish energy conservation standards for consumer products and industrial equipment, provided that the actions would not: (1) have the potential to cause a significant change in manufacturing infrastructure (such as construction of new manufacturing plants with considerable associated ground disturbance); (2) involve significant unresolved conflicts concerning alternative uses of available resources (such as rare or limited raw materials); (3) have the potential to result in a significant increase in the disposal of materials posing significant risks to human health and the environment (such as RCRA hazardous wastes); or (4) have the potential to cause a significant increase in energy consumption in a state or region.

### Rationale for determination:

The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) is proposing to provide federal funding to the University of New Haven to verify that the Automated Fault Detection and Diagnosis (AFDD) tools and technologies for retro-commissioning and continuous commissioning of electric heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC) systems can produce significant energy savings at the regional and national level.

Activities associated with the proposed project would include procurement, lab testing, installation, and field testing of pressure sensors, watt-hour meters, and temperature sensors. This equipment would be powered from the remote terminal unit's (RTU's) electrical panel and dataloggers would be placed inside the RTU. Some re-wiring may be necessary and some situations may require holes to be drilled in walls for the routing of that wiring. Additionally, the datalogger/AFDD enclosures may need to be anchored to the roof. Planning for field testing, and lab testing of HVAC AFDD tools, sensors and instrumentation would be completed from offices at the University of New Haven in New Haven, CT.

The exact sites for deployment and evaluation have not yet been identified and therefore, cannot be listed. However, field demonstration would take place in Connecticut at multiple sites in commercial buildings. Sites would likely include a mix of office, retail/grocery, restaurant, manufacturing, school, and municipal buildings. Based on the activities proposed, DOE does not anticipate any potential to cause effects to historic properties, assuming they were present; therefore, DOE has no further obligations under section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act. DOE does not anticipate any impacts to resources of concern--natural, cultural, or historic--due to the proposed activities of the

Potential hazards associated with this project include those typically associated with electrical work such as electrocution. Existing corporate safety policies would be observed at all times and proper personal protection equipment would be worn. There would be no waste generated from this project.

Based on the review of the proposal, DOE has determined the proposal fits within the class of action(s) and the integral elements of Appendix B to Subpart D of 10 CFR 1021 outlined in the DOE categorical exclusion(s) selected above. DOE has also determined that: (1) there are no extraordinary circumstances (as defined by 10 CFR 1021.410 (2)) related to the proposal that may affect the significance of the environmental effects of the proposal; (2) the proposal has not been segmented to meet the definition of a categorical exclusion; and (3) the proposal is not connected to other actions with potentially significant impacts, related to other proposals with cumulatively significant actions, or an improper interim action. This proposal is categorically excluded from further NEPA review.
