Based on my review of the information concerning the proposed action, as NEPA Compliance Officer (authorized under DOE Order 451.1A), I have made the following determination:

Description:

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A9 Information gathering, analysis, and dissemination	Information gathering (including, but not limited to, literature surveys, inventories, site visits, and audits), data analysis (including, but not limited to, computer modeling), document preparation (including, but not limited to, conceptual design, feasibility studies, and analytical energy supply and demand studies), and information dissemination (including, but not limited to, document publication and distribution, and classroom training and informational programs), but not including site characterization or environmental monitoring. Rationale for determination:

The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) is proposing to provide federal funding to Stone Mountain Technologies, Inc. (SMTI) to design, develop, fabricate, test, and field test natural gas-fired heat pump equipment for residential space heating. Project work would occur at SMTI's facility in Johnson City, TN; the Ingersoll Rand - Trane facility in Tyler, TX; and Gas Technology Institute's facility in Des Plaines, IL. Field test units would be tested at two residential single-family homes that have yet to be selected.

Project activities include the design, development, assembly, evaluation, and field testing of heat pump equipment as well as market assessment/techno-economic analysis of applications and climate zones. All project work, other than field testing, would be done in existing office space or a laboratory environment. No physical modifications or ground disturbing activities would be required and no change in the use of the facilities would result from project activities. No modifications to permits or new permits, additional licenses and/or authorizations would be necessary for proposed project activities. Project work would involve the use and handling of the natural refrigerant ammonia as well as the light fabrication of carbon steel metals. All handling and testing would occur in-lab, with proper safety procedures in place, and would pose no risk to the public. All hazardous materials would be managed in accordance with all federal, state, and local environmental regulations. All handling and testing of natural gas combustion systems would occur inlab, with proper safety procedures in place, and would pose no risk to the public. Part of the proposed project includes field testing of units developed during the proposed project. These units would be designed per relevant ANSI and ASHRAE standards and would be installed outside of two selected field test locations. The prototype heat pumps would be installed similarly to standard residential heat pumps for space heating/cooling and would be approximately 3 foot cubed. All of the refrigerant and natural combustion would be located outdoors. Licensed HVAC contractors familiar with installing and maintaining residential HVAC equipment would install the systems. Prior to installation, candidate field test sites would be identified for completion of on-site inspections to measure existing heating system baseline information and verify suitability for temporary installation of the field test units. Although the exact locations for field testing have yet to be determined, the recipient has stipulated that neither properties listed on the National Register of Historic Places nor properties eligible for listing would be selected as field testing locations. DOE does not anticipate any impacts to resources of concern due to the proposed activities of the project.

Based on the review of the proposal, DOE has determined the proposal fits within the class of action(s) and the integral elements of Appendix B to Subpart D of 10 CFR 1021 outlined in the DOE categorical exclusion(s) selected above. DOE has also determined that: (1) there are no extraordinary circumstances (as defined by 10 CFR 1021.410 (2)) related to the proposal that may affect the significance of the environmental effects of the proposal; (2) the proposal has not been segmented to meet the definition of a categorical exclusion; and (3) the proposal is not connected to other actions with potentially significant impacts, related to other proposals with cumulatively significant actions, or an improper interim action. This proposal is categorically excluded from further NEPA review.
