



Step 3: Develop an Energy Vision

- 1. Identify long-term aspirations and priorities to use as a basis for the vision
- 2. Create a focused vision statement
- 3. Share the final vision with the broader community







To Develop the Vision Statement

- Identify guiding principles for your local government and community
 - Gather existing statements of vision and aspiration from local leadership
 - Meet with appropriate stakeholders to help shape the list
- Integrate input to develop an energy vision that articulates what the jurisdiction/ community will look like when the CESP is implemented successfully





Create a Focused Vision Statement

BROAD	We want Austin to be the most livable community in the country – Austin, TX
	Reduce climate change impact, and become the renewable energy capital of Canada – <i>Toronto, ON</i>
	Albany is a model of community health and sustainability in its planning, restorative development, and conservation of energy, water, and natural resources – <i>Albany, NY</i>
	Assuring reliable, affordable, and clean electricity is essential to the continued attraction and retention of [New York] businesses and residents – <i>New York, NY</i>
SPECIFIC	Montpelier and its neighboring communities will be leaders in creating an economically sustainable and environmentally responsible community reducing fossil fuel consumption by at least 80% by 2030 – <i>Montpelier, VT</i>
