2001: Founded by Erica Mackie and Tim Sears

2004: First installation in California, Bay Area

2009: Expanded to 7 offices in California

2012-2014: Expanded to Colorado, New York (Tri-State) and D.C. (Mid-Atlantic)

2015: Promote diversity in the industry (RISE, Women in Solar)

 - Tribal College
 - Building local capacity
- Engage potential labor force
 - Students
 - Veterans
 - Women
- Encourage partnerships with Federal Agencies—DOE, DOI, HUD, technical assistance/plan






Partnering with GRID

Success Stories - Rosebud-Sioux

- Introduced to Ken Haukaas through a GRID installation in Boulder, CO
- Demonstration Project for Tribal Solarthon (Wells Fargo Grant)
- Collaboration on DOE Funding (10 homes, 58 kW DC)
- Partnerships
 - Sinte Gleska University, RESCO, and SWA Corp





Success Stories - Bishop Paiute

80 total projects installed, 304 kW DC

Solar Futures 2016

- 5 youth from Bishop Paiute Reservation
- 4 projects completed
- 5 in-class sessions
