Recommendation to the Department of Energy Recommendation Regarding Site-Specific Advisory Board Involvement in Enhancing Stakeholder/Public Engagement

Background

The Environmental Site-Specific Advisory Board (EM SSAB) understands that successful completion of the DOE-EM mission must include community, public and stakeholder education and engagement. This engagement can be developed and implemented in any of several different forms that reflect the public interest in; stage of cleanup combined with the complexity and uniqueness of each of the cleanup sites managed by DOE-EM.

Because of the variety of sites and different cleanup schedules, we are presenting a suite of potential activities that can be implemented at varying levels at each of the sites but are applicable to all in some form. Individual site-specific advisory boards are in the perfect position to help develop and recommend implementation strategies on each of these activities. Advisory board involvement would help the site enhance its outreach by providing advice related to specific targeted areas based on feedback from actual communities and individuals who live near or are potentially impacted by site activities.

Potential Activities:

- Site managers and/or designees should work with their advisory board to determine the additional needs for public information exchange and opportunities for engagement. Specifically, this can be done using a Community Analysis or previously collected data from public meeting attendance, outreach efforts, etc. To determine the level of public interest, these activities may include a far reaching individual regional community analysis; polling selected public interest groups; polling advisory board members, etc. Include the site specific advisory board in developing questions for the community analysis if that method of obtaining information is chosen. Advisory Board members could provide specific recommendations to the site manager related to improving outreach efforts in particular affected communities.
- Prepare a one-page or three-fold handout of their site's information sources listed with videos, speakers, topics, websites, tour information, etc. Send it to each applicable Chamber of Commerce with a request to further provide to local civic and service organizations, churches, veterans groups, senior centers and libraries with a suggested transmittal letter.
- Develop a virtual reality tour that includes clear, in-depth information that will help the public understand the depth and breadth of cleanup decisions and activities. Provide this to the public and local and regional educational institutions.
- Enhance educational outreach:
 - Develop a site-specific program educational exhibit booth(s) with handouts and educational tools that assist educators (from elementary school level through college) with the history and legacy of the site.


- Coordinate with local and regional school districts and college departments that teach environmental science to develop a relationship and inform them about the environmental educational sources and include a site tour for educators.
- Develop displays (could be 3D) located in public and educational libraries that provide in-depth information on one or more site subjects; i.e. upcoming cleanup decisions soliciting public comment; site successes/challenges, transportation routes; identifying websites for more info, etc. These should be updated regularly/quarterly – especially for time-sensitive information.

Recommendation

We recommend that the individual site managers/designees and their advisory boards work together to discuss and determine which activities best suit their circumstances and respond to public needs. The detail, depth, and implementation plan should result from this collaborative effort.

INTRODUCTION

The Paducah Gaseous Diffusion Plant (PGDP) Citizens Advisory Board (CAB) is a Federal Advisory Committee Act board, chartered to provide advice to the U. S. Department of Energy (DOE) Office of Environmental Management located at the Paducah Site. The Portsmouth/Paducah Project Office (PPPO) manages the Environmental Management activities in Paducah.

The CAB is comprised of up to 18 individuals from the Western Kentucky and Southern Illinois areas. The members, who can serve up to three consecutive two-year terms, represent business, academia, labor, local government, environmentalist, special interest groups, and the general public. In addition to DOE, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Region IV, the Kentucky Department of Waste Management, the Kentucky Cabinet for Health Services, and the West Kentucky Wildlife Management Area are represented on the board in an advisory capacity.

The scope of the CAB is to provide advice and recommendations concerning the following EM site-specific issues: clean-up standards and environmental restoration; waste management and disposition; stabilization and disposition of non-stockpile nuclear materials; excess facilities; future land use and long term stewardship; risk assessment and management; and clean-up science and technology activities. The Board may also be asked to provide advice and recommendations on any other EM projects or issues.

The Board meets monthly to hear presentations by persons working on relevant environmental management topics. Additionally the Board meets to consider recommendations developed by the PGDP CAB, to listen to and discuss input from citizens, and perform other business. The Board strives for consensus in reaching decisions and conducts business under a set of bylaws, standing rules, and special rules of order..

The Paducah CAB generally works to achieve its mission through its subcommittee structure, and each year the Board holds a planning meeting to determine how best to address its mission. An active educational series operating in an administrative and preparatory manner to prepare board members and future subcommittees for the task of advising DOE. The educational series has been developed based on future project priorities, as selected by the CAB members, with guidance from DOE. They are:

- Remediation Technology
- Land Transfer/Footprint Reduction

Additional topics for discussion will include the Federal Budgeting Process, Community Engagement and Site Reconfiguration.

This Work Plan addresses the CAB's educational priorities for the 2019 Fiscal Year, and the anticipated topics for 2020 Fiscal Year. While the Board intends to structure their activities to focus on the priority subjects, it is understood that other topics may present themselves that could result in deviation from the Work Plan and the development of *Ad Hoc* subcommittees.

CAB Executive Committee

The Board's Executive Committee is typically comprised of the current board chair and vice chair; and chairs of active subcommittees established at the annual retreat. Under the current CAB structure, the 2018 Executive Committee will be comprised of the Board Chair, Vice Chair, the past Vice Chair and 3 "delegate" board members as elected by the CAB. The Executive Committee meets regularly to

direct administrative actions of the CAB, as well as to maintain the focus and direction of the Board and any *Ad Hoc* subcommittees

CAB Meetings

CAB meetings are intended to communicate the business of the CAB and to discuss and vote on recommendations to be submitted to DOE. In addition, DOE and liaison comments will be made in the form of a presentation intended to brief CAB members of recent developments and provide site highlights and accomplishments. The CAB will populate and support two subcommittees: Remediation Technology (RT), and Land Transfer/Footprint Reduction (LT/FR).



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Paducah Gaseous Diffusion Plant Citizens Advisory Board Meeting Minutes November 29, 2018

The Citizens Advisory Board (CAB) met at the West Kentucky Community and Technical College in Paducah, Kentucky on Thursday, November 29th at 6:00 p.m.

Board members present: Renie Barger, Bill Murphy, Mike Kemp, Victoria Caldwell, Carol Young, Patrick White, Renea Akin, Judy Clayton, David Homra, Fran Johnson and Celeste Emerson.

Board Members absent: Cindy Butterbaugh, Nancy Duff and Shay Morgan.

Board Liaisons and related regulatory agency employees: Brian Lainhart, Commonwealth of Kentucky;

DOE Deputy Designated Federal Official: Jennifer Woodard, DOE.

U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) related employees: Robert Smith, DOE; Steve Christmas, Four Rivers Nuclear Partnership, LLC (FRNP); Eric Roberts, Jim Ethridge, EHI Consultants (EHI).

Public: Mike Turnbow.

Murphy called the meeting to order. **Roberts** then outlined the items on the agenda. **Woodard** then provided comments.

Woodard reported that the access road to the site is being re-paved. She then said that the new projected start of field work to tear down the C-400 building is now August 2019. **Woodard** added that the demolition of C-400 would be done by a subcontractor, not the union or site workers.

Murphy asked if DOE was having to start over with deliberations with regulators on the C-400 work. **Woodard** said that it wasn't starting over completely, but almost. **Akin** asked if the funding would be lost. **Woodard** answered that it would not. **White** asked if **Woodard** thought that the project would actually start in August. **Woodard** said that that date was a "best case" and that she personally thought that the project would not start until after October. **White** then asked if DOE had other projects in mind if the C-400 work took longer than projected. **Woodard** said that they have requested suggestions from the contractor (FRNP) for that reason.

Kemp asked what the dispute was concerning the cost analysis report. **Woodard** said that one issue was a disagreement over the size of the "area of contamination" for C-400. She added that another issue was the classification of the landfill, whether or not it is "onsite" or "offsite". **Murphy** asked would anything outside the property fence be considered "offsite". **Woodard** indicated that they considered where the landfill is located would be "onsite". **Woodard** then said that another issue was

rad effluent that is discharged. **Murphy** then asked how the "onsite/offsite" issue would be resolved. **Woodard** indicated that it was a legal issue and the EPA had the final decision.

Kemp asked if there was anything that could be done to improve cooperation among the agencies. **Woodard** said she thought that there was, but it was not a quick process.

Smith reported that the upcoming DOE Science Bowl will be held on February 1st for the high school, and February 15th for the middle school. He added that if any of the Board members wanted to volunteer to help, to just sign up.

Woodard the reported that Gaye Brewer with the Kentucky Department of Environmental Protection was retiring from that agency and would no longer be attending Board meetings.

Murphy introduced a recommendation for vote from the Fall Chairs meeting concerning public involvement. It was approved by unanimous approval from the Board, 11-0.

Roberts then introduced the CAB Workplan for 2019 for review and approval. The Workplan was approved by a vote of 11-0.

The Board then took nominations for the two-year office of Vice Chair, beginning in January 2019. **Caldwell** was the only nomination and was elected by a vote of 11-0.

Election for members to serve on the Executive Committee was introduced. It was decided that the Chair, Vice Chair, and the immediate past Chair or Vice Chair would automatically serve on the committee, along with three elected members. **Barger**, **Akin**, and **Johnson** was elected to serve. Considering that **Barger's** membership ends in June 2019, **White** was added to the group to fill out the committee for a whole year.

Murphy adjourned the meeting at 7:00 pm.
