## Craig-Rifle 230-kV Transmission Line Access Road Maintenance Moffat County, Colorado Project Numbers: 2016-003 & 2016-080

A. <u>Brief Description of Proposal</u>: Western Area Power Administration (WAPA), Rocky Mountain Region, proposes to conduct routine road maintenance on existing roads used to access the Craig-Rifle 345-kV (CRG-RFL) Transmission Line. This work would occur within WAPA's right-of-way (ROW) and access routes south of the City of Craig in Moffat County, Colorado. The project transmission line segments are approximately 18.8 miles long and are between structures 8/3 to 27/1. Access road maintenance may include: blading; grading; removal of rocks and other obstacles impeding safe travel; repair, replacement, and installation of water bars, rip-rap, and other erosion control measures; and cleanout, repair, and replacement of culverts and other drainage features. No new roads would be constructed. Equipment used for this project may include a motor grader, dozer, excavator, skid-steer, and work trucks. Work would occur predominantly on privately-owned lands, as well as small tracts of public lands managed by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM).

- C. <u>Regulatory Requirements in 10 CFR 1021.410 (b)</u>: (See full text in regulation and attached checklist.)
  - 1) The proposed action fits within a class of actions listed in Appendix A or B to Subpart D.

For classes of actions listed in Appendix B, the following conditions are integral elements. To fit within a class, the proposal <u>must not</u>:

- Threaten a violation of applicable statutory, regulatory, or permit requirements for environment, safety, and health, or similar requirements of DOE or Executive Orders;
- Require siting and construction or major expansion of waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment facilities (including incinerators), but the proposal may include categorically excluded waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment actions or facilities;
- Disturb hazardous substances, pollutants, contaminants, or CERCLA-excluded petroleum and natural gas products that preexist in the environment such that there would be uncontrolled or unpermitted releases;
- Have the potential to cause significant impacts on environmentally sensitive resources. An environmentally sensitive resource is typically a resource that has been identified as needing protection through Executive Order, statute, or regulation by Federal, State, or local government, or a federally recognized Indian tribe. An action may be categorically excluded if, although sensitive resources are present, the action would not have the potential to cause significant impacts on those resources (such as construction of a building with its foundation well above a sole-source aquifer or upland surface soil removal on a site that has wetlands). Environmentally sensitive resources include, but are not limited to, those listed in paragraph B. (4) (see Attachment A).

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- 2) There are no extraordinary circumstances related to the proposal that may affect the significance of the environmental effects of the proposal.
- The proposal is not "connected" to other actions with potentially significant impacts, is not related to other proposed actions with cumulatively significant impacts, and is not precluded by 40 CFR 1506.1 or 10 CFR 1021.211.

## D. <u>Special Stipulations Pertaining to the Proposal:</u>

- 1. If the scope of work of this project changes, RMR's Environment Department must be contacted to determine whether additional environmental review is required.
- 2. This Categorical Exclusion expires three years from the signature date. If all project work has not been completed by the expiration date, or if the need for an environmental compliance extension is anticipated, RMR's Environment Department must be contacted for an updated environmental review.
- 3. Any injured or dead birds encountered on WAPA's ROW shall be immediately reported to the RMR Avian Protection Leads by telephone at 970-593-8803 or 970-278-7119. Additional documentation, such as photographs and GPS coordinates, may be requested to support RMR's reporting requirements to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.
- 4. Active avian nests must not be disturbed or damaged. An avian nest becomes active when the first egg is laid, and remains active until all offspring have fledged and the nest is empty. Any active nests located on WAPA's transmission structures, substation equipment, or other areas that may threaten the safety of the nesting birds or pose a threat of fire hazard, mechanical failure, or power outage must be reported to the RMR Avian Protection Leads as soon as possible. Inactive nests that do not belong to threatened species, endangered species, or eagles may be removed and destroyed in accordance with WAPA's Avian Protection Plan (APP). Contact RMR's Environment Department prior to nest removal to ensure conformance with the APP.
- 5. Cultural resources that must be avoided have been identified on maps which are provided to WAPA's maintenance crews. No access road maintenance will occur within cultural resource boundaries and all access for access road maintenance crews will occur within existing access roads.
- 6. If any cultural resources are inadvertently discovered during implementation of the proposed action, work within 100-feet of the discovery area shall halt immediately, RMR's Archaeologist shall be contacted immediately. Work in the area of discovery shall not resume until notification to proceed is provided by RMR's Archaeologist.

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- 7. If any possible human remains are inadvertently discovered during implementation of the proposed action, work within 100-feet of the discovery area shall halt immediately and RMR's Archaeologist shall be notified immediately by telephone (no later than 24 hours from the time of discovery). A reasonable effort shall be made to protect the remains from looting and/or further damage. Work in the area of discovery shall not resume until notification to proceed is provided by RMR's Archaeologist.
- **E.** <u>Determination</u>: Based on my review of information provided to me and in my possession concerning the proposed action, I determined that the proposed action fits within the specified class of actions, the other regulatory requirements set forth above are met, and the proposed action is categorically excluded from requirements for an EA or an EIS.
