Covered actions include building renovations or new structures, provided that they occur in a previously disturbed or developed area. Covered actions could involve commercial, residential, agricultural, academic, institutional, or industrial sectors. Covered actions do not include rulemakings, standard-settings, or proposed DOE legislation, except for those actions listed in B5.1(b) of this appendix. (b) Covered actions include rulemakings that establish energy conservation standards for consumer products and industrial equipment, provided that the actions would not: (1) have the potential to cause a significant change in manufacturing infrastructure (such as construction of new manufacturing plants with considerable associated ground disturbance); (2) involve significant unresolved conflicts concerning alternative uses of available resources (such as rare or limited raw materials); (3) have the potential to result in a significant increase in the disposal of materials posing significant risks to human health and the environment (such as RCRA hazardous wastes); or (4) have the potential to cause a significant increase in energy consumption in a state or region.

The installation, modification, operation, and removal of commercially available solar photovoltaic systems located on a building or other structure (such as rooftop, parking lot or facility, and mounted to signage, lighting, gates, or fences), or if located on land, generally comprising less than 10 acres within a previously disturbed or developed area. Covered actions would be in accordance with applicable requirements (such as local land use and zoning requirements) in the proposed project area and would incorporate appropriate control technologies and best management practices.

Rationale for determination:

The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) is proposing to provide funding to the Wisconsin Office of Energy Innovation through the Energy Innovation Grant Program for energy efficiency upgrades and a solar photovoltaic (PV) installation at the Juda School District building in Juda, WI. The elementary, middle, senior high school, and the district offices, are co-located on the same campus in adjoining buildings.

Proposed activities include retrofitting the lighting with LED bulbs, (with occupancy sensors in the gymnasium), and building envelope improvements to reduce air leakage (by adding weather stripping and foam), mechanical system optimization (installing demand control ventilation, variable frequency drives on heating, ventilation and air conditioning units, occupancy CO2 sensors, and building system automation). Additionally, a 4.2kW solar photovoltaic (PV) system would be designed and installed on the roof, and connected to the grid through the local power company. The PV installation would not require structural improvements to the roof or ground disturbance. Minor electrical modifications for connections would be required for many of the activities. All required building permits would be obtained.

The school district installed a 5.0kW PV system in 2014, and a 7.5kW PV system in 2015. With the addition of the proposed 4.2kW PV system, it is anticipated the school district will achieve its goal of 10% of its power from renewable sources. No additional PV installations are currently planned.

The school district buildings are not listed on the National Register of Historic Places and are not located in the floodplain.
