A. Brief Description of Proposal: Western Area Power Administration (WAPA), Rocky Mountain Region (RMR), completed emergency structure replacements on its Spring Canyon-North Yuma (SGC-NYU) 230-kV and Wildhorse Creek-Frenchman Creek (WHK-FRC) 115-kV Transmission Lines in response to storm damage sustained on June 6, 2020. Structures 62/6, 62/7, 63/1, 63/2, 63/3, 63/4, 63/5, 63/6, 63/7, 64/1, 64/2, 64/3, 64/4, 64/5, 64/6, 64/7, 65/1, 65/2, 65/3, and 66/7 were replaced on the SGC-NYU Transmission Line in Logan County, Colorado. Structures 29/4, 29/5, 29/6, 29/7, 29/8, 29/9, 30/1, and 30/2 were replaced on the WHK-FRC Transmission Line in Phillips County, Colorado. The new structures have minor structural updates to meet current WAPA design standards, but are visually similar to the original (damaged) structures, and were placed in the original structure holes. The full scope of the structure replacements included removing the original structures, re-drilling the original structure holes, installing the new wood structures, backfilling the structure holes, and installing new hardware. Equipment used for this emergency work included truck-mounted augers and cranes, backhoes, bucket trucks, chainsaws, dump trucks, helicopters, skid-steer loaders, utility trucks, pole trailers, and equipment trailers. Work occurred on WAPA's existing right-of-way (ROW) on private lands. Existing access routes and overland access within WAPA's ROW were used and no road maintenance or new road construction occurred.

B. Special Stipulations Pertaining to the Proposal:

This Categorical Exclusion (CX) covers emergency work that has already been completed. No further work is authorized under this CX. If additional work is required, RMR's Environment Department must be contacted to determine whether additional environmental review is required.
