Based on my review of the information concerning the proposed action, as NEPA Compliance Officer (authorized under DOE Policy 451.1), I have made the following determination:

Description:

A9 Information gathering, analysis, and dissemination Information gathering (including, but not limited to, literature surveys, inventories, site visits, and audits), data analysis (including, but not limited to, computer modeling), document preparation (including, but not limited to, conceptual design, feasibility studies, and analytical energy supply and demand studies), and information dissemination (including, but not limited to, document publication and distribution, and classroom training and informational programs), but not including site characterization or environmental monitoring. B3.6 Smallscale research and development, laboratory operations, and pilot projects

Siting, construction, modification, operation, and decommissioning of facilities for smallscale research and development projects; conventional laboratory operations (such as preparation of chemical standards and sample analysis); and small-scale pilot projects (generally less than 2 years) frequently conducted to verify a concept before demonstration actions, provided that construction or modification would be within or contiguous to a previously disturbed or developed area (where active utilities and currently used roads are readily accessible). Not included in this category are demonstration actions, meaning actions that are undertaken at a scale to show whether a technology would be viable on a larger scale and suitable for commercial deployment.

B3.15 Smallscale indoor research and development projects using nanoscale materials

Siting, construction, modification, operation, and decommissioning of facilities for indoor small-scale research and development projects and small-scale pilot projects using nanoscale materials in accordance with applicable requirements (such as engineering, worker safety, procedural, and administrative regulations) necessary to ensure the containment of any hazardous materials. Construction and modification activities would be within or contiguous to a previously disturbed or developed area (where active utilities and currently used roads are readily accessible).

## Rationale for determination:

The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) is proposing to provide funding to the University of Arizona (UA) to design, develop, fabricate, and test a unique perovskite photovoltaic (PV) cell architecture. The novel architecture would include nanofibers to improve cell performance and durability.

Award activities would include optimization of nanofiber and perovskite deposition processes, PV cell fabrication, and testing and evaluation of fabricated PV cells. Evaluation activities would include the use of scanning electron microscopy (SEM), atomic force microscopy (AFM), X-ray, ultraviolet (UV) photoelectron spectroscopy (PES) technologies. All award activities, including fabrication activities, would occur in controlled laboratory settings at the UA campus.

The laboratory facilities at UA are purpose-built facilities for the type of work to be conducted for this project. Modifications would not be required for any facility. All emissions resulting from award activities would be in compliance with UA's existing Title V Air Quality Permit (#2371), issued by the Pima County Department of Environmental Quality. Award activities would involve the handling of hazardous materials, including: laboratory chemicals, lead-based materials, and industrial solvents. All handling of hazardous materials would be done in accordance with existing federal, state, and local laws and regulations. All nanoscale materials would be handled

using fume hoods or gloveboxes until adhered to surface materials (i.e. substrates). Existing university health, safety, and environmental policies and procedures consistent with industry-standard best practices would be followed at all facilities, including: training of personnel, proper personal protective equipment (PPE), engineering controls, monitoring, and internal assessments.

The proposed action has not been segmented to meet the definition of a categorical exclusion. This proposal is not connected to other actions with potentially significant impacts (40 CFR 1508.25(a)(1)), is not related to other actions with individually insignificant but cumulatively significant impacts (40 CFR 1508.27(b)(7)), and is not precluded by 40 CFR 1506.1 or 10 CFR 1021.211 concerning limitations on actions during preparation of an environmental impact statement.

The proposed action is categorically excluded from further NEPA review.
