1 **Minutes**

2 **I. Call to Order**

3 The meeting of the Northern New Mexico Citizens’ Advisory Board (NNMCAB) was held on
4 March 16, 2022, in a hybrid format. Mr. Lee Bishop, Deputy Designated Federal Officer
5 (DDFO) stated that on behalf of the Department of Energy (DOE) the meeting of the
6 NNMCAB was called to order at 1:02 p.m.

7 Mr. Bishop recognized Ms. Cherylin Atcitty, the NNMCAB Chair. Ms. Atcitty presided at the
8 meeting.

9 The meeting of the NNMCAB was open to the public and posted in The Federal Register in
10 accordance with the Federal Advisory Committee Act.

11 **II. Welcome and Introductions**

12 Mr. Bishop welcomed everyone to the meeting and turned the meeting over to Ms. Atcitty.
13 Ms. Atcitty welcomed everyone to the March Board Meeting. Ms. Atcitty asked Ms.
14 Santistevan to conduct roll call for members and guests.
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16 **III. Establishment of a Quorum (Roll Call)**

17 Ms. Menice Santistevan conducted roll call for board members and guests on WebEx. At the
18 call to order, 6 NNMCAB members were present or online. Ms. Santistevan stated that the
19 meeting was being recorded to produce the minutes of the meeting.
20

21 **IV. Approval of Agenda**

22 The board reviewed the agenda for the March 16, 2022, meeting. Ms. Atcitty opened the
23 floor to entertain a motion to approve the agenda.
24 Mr. Mark Hayden made a motion to approve the agenda; Ubaldo Gallegos seconded the
25 motion. The motion to approve the agenda passed.
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27 **V. Approval of Minutes**

28 The board reviewed the minutes from the January 19, 2022, Board Meeting. Ms. Atcitty
29 opened the floor to entertain a motion.
30 Ms. Angelica Gurulé made a motion to approve the minutes as presented; Mr. Mark Hayden
31 seconded the motion. Ms. Atcitty opened the floor for discussion.
32 With no discussion, the motion to approve the minutes as presented passed.
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34 **VI. Old Business**

35 **a. Update from Chair/Vice-Chair, and Committee Chairs**

36 Ms. Atcitty – No update.
37 Ms. Fernandez – the Outreach Committee met last month during the committee
38 meeting and due to member status, she was serving as Interim Chair and Mr. Miguel
39

1 Vigil was serving as the Interim Vice-Chair. The Outreach Committee has not yet met for
2 formal elections.

3 Mr. Hull – at the last Combined Committee Meetings, members broke out into breakout
4 sessions to work on the Committee Work Plans. The Risk Committee consisted of Mr.
5 Hull and Mr. Grogan and they updated the Work Plan with no significant changes. They
6 did include: a statement about the bi-monthly status report, in Section 6 they changed
7 the list of Corrective Measures Evaluations (CME) and aligned it with the Consent Order
8 Committee, 10 active campaigns, CME for Material Disposal Areas (MDA), update for
9 the Los Alamos Town Site issues, level 101 training for risk analyses, participation in
10 April 2022 EM Site Tour, understanding where LANL Legacy Waste has been sent within
11 and outside the State, added shipments to the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant (WIPP) Site,
12 and corrected dates in the previous Work Plan. Mr. Hull, Ms. Fernandez, and Mr. Grogan
13 attended the Technical Working Group (TWG) Meetings, the first was on detection limits
14 for environmental data. The second TWG meeting was on the Chromium Interim
15 Measures and the presentation was given by Danny Katzman. Additional Old Business,
16 the NNM CAB still has not heard anything from Headquarters on approval of the
17 NNM CAB Bylaws.

18 Mr. Hayden – Draft of the Work Plan was substantially updated last year, and he only
19 needs to put the final touches on it. Some items discussed were, onboarding for new
20 members, a tour of Los Alamos National Laboratory (LANL), and expansion of the
21 membership.

22 **b. Report on Waste Management Symposia**

23 Ms. Atcity attended the Waste Management Symposia March 7-9, 2022 and was the
24 first time she has attended. She noted that it was very informative and there were many
25 sessions concurrently that she would have liked to attend. She chose the session for the
26 update on the Tuba City, Arizona, Disposal Site. She was able to meet with Mr. Mark
27 Bollinger from the Carlsbad Field Office, and he stated that he would be interested in
28 conducting a site tour for NNM CAB Members in the near future. There was a great
29 representation from Los Alamos for the EM efforts with the Justice40 Initiative. Some of
30 the other topics covered were the post-pandemic impacts where they found that some
31 employees were more productive working at home and many of the offices are trying to
32 make that transition, also with the pandemic, working with the contractors and
33 agencies, there is always a varying level of safety protocols they have to adhere to. She
34 noted that one of the highlights was the Los Alamos Legacy Cleanup Program and it was
35 an overview of all the cleanup activities with Triad, N3B, and DOE EM.

36 **VII. New Business**

37
38 Mr. Bishop stated that Headquarters was taking a poll on the EM SSAB Chairs Meeting
39 attendance if they were to hold the meeting in person in May. He noted that we would send
40 the Chair, Vice-Chair, and one to two other members. He asked for members to let the staff
41 know if they would like to continue to attend virtually or in person.

42 Membership – He and Ms. Santistevan spoke with Ms. Kelly Snyder on membership
43 packages. Ms. Santistevan stated that the NNM CAB Membership Package was still sitting
44 with the White House Liaison Office. She noted that Ms. Snyder had stated that as things

1 were happening around the world it has taken much energy and the packet had not moved
2 from that office.

3 Mr. Bishop stated that the next meeting would be a Combined Committee Meeting in April
4 and the topic would be a primer on radiological terms and the committees would work on
5 their Work Plans. He noted that the tour of LANL would not be in April. Mr. Bishop stated
6 that the next Board Meeting would be in May and in June the plan is to have the LANL Tour.

7 Mr. Bishop stated that all the staff was back in the office, Federal and Contractor Staff. He
8 noted that Los Alamos County was in the medium level of transmission, so they were able to
9 remove the mask mandate in the office.

10 Mr. Bishop stated that this was Ms. Angelica Gurulé's last meeting. She has been an
11 outstanding member and he noted that a certificate of appreciation would be sent to her.

12 Mr. Hull stated that the Executive Committee met with Ike White, EM-1 in February. He
13 noted that in the meeting they discussed membership and the areas around here that might
14 have an interest in the cleanup but have not had the opportunity to participate with the
15 NNMCAB. Mr. Hull state that Mr. Mikolanis and Mr. White both agreed that in their
16 experience in other locations, the state would participate. Mr. Hull noted that there are 21
17 or 23 Tribal Groups that exist within a 50-mile radius of Los Alamos. Mr. Hull stated that he
18 made a suggested recommendation that the Outreach Committee should convene and
19 come up with an established approach to reach out to additional members beyond our
20 current area. Mr. Hull also stated that the NNMCAB would also have to address the Bylaws
21 to address this aspect of expanded membership.

22 Mr. Bishop stated that he spoke with Ms. Snyder and she agreed with re-defining the
23 boundaries. Ms. Snyder would prefer that the membership should stay within the directly
24 impacted communities. Mr. Bishop also stated that the Outreach Committee should come
25 up with a proposal to modify the Bylaws.

26 Ms. Gurulé stated that in the Work Plan discussions at the committee meeting, they
27 discussed membership and possibly making a recommendation to have official appointees,
28 and public positions, making sure that the communities are represented on the Board. She
29 noted that they discussed keeping membership along the WIPP corridor, the communities
30 that are directly impacted by LANL operations, including the tribes around Los Alamos and
31 along the way to Carlsbad.

32 Ms. Santistevan stated that Ms. Snyder advised them that they could possibly look at having
33 liaison members for possibly Pueblos or other organizations that might want to nominate
34 someone. She noted that they do not have to go through the formal approval process. Ms.
35 Santistevan stated that in terms of the Bylaws, Headquarters is working on the EM SSAB
36 Charter and she prefers that the NNMCAB wait on the Charter and the new Policies and
37 Procedures document to come out before amending the Bylaws to ensure that they are
38 working in conjunction with those two documents.

39 **VIII. EM-LA Field Office Update**

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41 Mr. Bishop gave the update for Mr. Mikolanis.

42 Waste Management – EM-LA was a highlighted site. EM-LA and N3B presented and gave
43 aspects of the cleanup at Los Alamos. Attending were Ms. Kim Lebak (overview of the

1 cleanup), Mr. Troy Thomson (remediation, scope and progress being made), Mr. Joe Legare
2 (recruitment and retention), Mr. Joe Sena (overview of the water program), and Ms. Nicole
3 Nelson-Jean (Justice40 Pilot Program). Also speaking were Mr. Mikolanis, the Lt. Governor of
4 San Ildefonso Pueblo, Mr. Raymond Martinez, and one of the field technicians that went
5 through the N3B Apprentice Program, Brooke Baker.

6 Recent Visits – Mr. Ike White, EM-1, visited Los Alamos and met with the NNMCAB
7 Executive Committee. Ms. Nicole Nelson-Jean, EM-3 met with the Santa Fe Indian
8 Superintendent and the STEM program members to talk about the Environmental Justice40
9 effort.

10 Chromium – Well R-71 was installed, and the first sample was taken. This milestone was
11 completed two weeks early. A couple of drilling Work Plans were submitted to get a couple
12 of new wells approved (R-74 for RDX) and (R-73). Wells R-76 and R-77 Work Plans will be
13 submitted early.

14 Milestones – They have 19 milestones this fiscal year. They have completed four of them on
15 time or early.

16 Waste Management Operations – This calendar year they have completed twenty
17 shipments to WIPP and will have a couple more this week. DOE also just finished the Federal
18 Readiness Review for the Drill and Drain Project that will take drums that are non-compliant
19 and target liquids in there to make them compliant and certified to go to WIPP. In August
20 they are planning to retrieve the first corrugated metal pipe (CMP) to size reduce and ship
21 to WIPP.

22 Middle DP Road – They found some soil contamination which caused them to step out and
23 take some more samples and collect more soils. The soil was contaminated with Cadmium, a
24 little bit of Lead and Copper.

25 Budget – President Biden signed the budget out along with the Ukrainian Support Bill. The
26 budget is indicating a plus up for EM-LA and still has to go through the process for approval.
27 DOE will be having discussions with NMED on what they will bring above the line on the
28 priority list.

29 Mr. Grogan asked for a response to the U.S. Government Accountability Office (GAO) Report
30 from DOE. This is in regards to the AP Article, “Waste Isolation Pilot Plant: Construction the
31 Need for DOE to Address Root Causes.”

32 Mr. Bishop stated that he would have the EM-LA Public Affairs send an official response.

33 **IX. Update on Justice40 Initiative**

34 Ms. Miquela Vargas, EM-LA, gave a presentation titled, “EM-LA Efforts Within the Justice40

39 **X. Update from N3B**

40 Mr. Troy Thomson, Environmental Remediation Program Manager, N3B, gave the update
41 for Mr. Joe Legare. He will concentrate on planned work going forward.
42

1 **Waste**

2 TRU Waste Program, there are two shipments coming up the next week which will bring
3 them up to 22 shipments. They have 30 planned to ship for FY22. They will resume re-
4 skinning two of the domes in Area G where TRU waste is stored for safe and compliant
5 storage for the waste containers.

6 Low Level Waste (LLW) Shipments – they have shipped over 130 cubic meters of CH TRU
7 LLW inventory. They have a target of 400 cubic meters in FY22.

8 CMP Campaign – Wastewater that was treated by cementation into CMPs. They are
9 continuing their efforts to be able to retrieve them from the underground storage locations.
10 They need to complete the mock-ups and on the job training with their work crews. They
11 are also doing operational testing of the hydraulic shear and performing mock-ups with it
12 for cutting the CMPs to sizes that will fit into solid waste boxes for shipment to WIPP. They
13 are also brining in new process lines in over time. One will be a glovebag processing line that
14 will allow them to empty contents of TRU waste drums in a contained area so they can sort,
15 segregate, and repackage those materials to meet WIPP’s acceptance criteria for
16 transportation. They will process about 1,500 containers of TRU waste for disposal at WIPP.

17 DOE has performed some reviews and assessments of the work N3B is doing in the glovebag
18 processing line. Based on comments, N3B will revise their method and approaches, will
19 continue to train and use the mock-ups as a training tool, then go into operation of those
20 new processing lines.

21 **Water**

22 Chromium - They continue to operate the Chromium treatment system. It has been
23 effective in controlling the migration of the plume on the southern and eastern boundaries.
24 They are working with with NMED to move into final remedy. They are currently building a
25 well pad in Mortandad Canyon for well R-73.

26 There are two drilling Work Plans that will be submitted to NMED within the next week to
27 two weeks. They will be for R-77 for a new monitoring well for the Chromium Plume and R-
28 76 which will be a replacement for well R-28.

29 Royal Demolition Explosives (RDX) Plume – They are continuing to monitor the plume. They
30 just turned in a drilling work plan to NMED for a new monitoring well, R-74.

31 **Land**

32 Middle DP Road is progressing. They completed excavations and confirmation sampling in
33 the last few months. Confirmation sampling was completed in January. They had a few areas
34 that were above the residential screening levels for soil. They will go in and take more
35 samples to make sure they know nature and extent. The final report will be submitted to
36 NMED for review and approval after all the sampling and excavations are complete.

37 Aggregate Areas – In the next couple of months they will have sampling going on at Twomile
38 Canyon in the Pajarito Watershed. They have completed some change control with their
39 contract and are getting out in the field as quickly as they can. In the last month they have
40 also sampled two Solid Waste Management Units (SWMU) out at Threemile Canyon. It was
41 critical to get out in the field relatively quickly because they would not have access to it by
42 the end of February due to the Spotted Owls nesting in that area.

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2 **XI. Update from New Mexico Environment Department**

3 Mr. Rick Shean, Hazardous Waste Bureau (HWB) Chief, gave the update for NMED.

4 **CO Milestones** – 19 milestones were finalized for FY22. The R-73 drilling work plan was
5 received, reviewed, and approved. The work plans for wells R-71 and R-72 were submitted
6 on time. NMED has sent out draft comments on the Supplemental Investigation Reports for
7 TA-49 in and outside the Nuclear Environmental Site Boundary and both of the reports are
8 milestones for FY22 due in May 2022.

9 **DP Middle Road** – NMED received an update for the implementation of the work plan on
10 February 25th and due to the expanded footprint of the contamination, they expect the final
11 report to be submitted six months after they have completed the field work.

12 **Other Groundwater Projects** – NMED attended the pre-submittal meeting for the Facility
13 Wide Groundwater Monitoring Plan on March 10th. Currently the HWB is working with an
14 outside consultant and EPA to pull together a guidance document for the aquifer testing
15 facility wide. NMED is going to be hosting a series of Technical Team Meetings with DOE to
16 prepare for the FY22 Milestone Work Plan to adjust the Chromium Plume Control Interim
17 Measures. They have received two Work Plans this month to install two monitoring wells for
18 the Chromium Plume and one in the RDX Plume. NMED is also working with the State
19 Engineers Office to make sure that the monitoring well R-25 is abandoned properly.

20 **Other Consent Order Documents** – NMED met with DOE to discuss the MDA L Interim
21 Measures Soil Vapor Monitoring Report. NMED feels that the interim measure of the soil
22 vapor extraction has been successful, and DOE will continue that process until a final
23 remedy is selected and implemented. NMED has reviewed the Annual Progress Report for
24 RDX CME and Deep Groundwater on February 23rd. They have approved the 2019 revised
25 Work Plan for the Plug and Abandonment of the wells on February 8th.

26 **Permit Related LANL Activities** – NMED is still reviewing the permit renewal application and
27 they are holding regular meetings with DOE to resolve the administrative incomplete
28 comments they have made on it. There was a 60-day extension submitted to review the
29 comments by DOE after discussions with NMED.

30 **WIPP Update** – The 10-year permit renewal is going, the application was submitted by DOE
31 on March 31, 2020 and is under technical review at NMED. The Class 3 modifications for
32 new panels 11 and 12 were submitted July 30, 2021 and the 60-day comment period was
33 completed October 4, 2021. On December 17, 2021 NMED requested that WIPP consolidate
34 the Class 3 with the renewal application and the new deadline for that submittal is March
35 17, 2022. The goal is to review both permitting items in one permitting process going
36 forward.

37 The Class 2 modification to update Panel 8 Volatile Organic Compound Room-Based Limits
38 was submitted October 15, 2021. A public meeting was held on November 9, 2021. The 60-
39 day comment period ended on December 20, 2021. NMED took final action that on
40 February 11, 2022.

41 **Shipments Update (Calendar Year)** - Total containers emplaced is 535 this year and the total
42 shipments are 22. Shipments to WIPP so far this year are 11 from Idaho National Laboratory
43 and 11 from LANL.

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2 **XII. Public Comment Period**

3 Ms. Atcitty opened the floor for public comment at 3:07 p.m.

4 Mr. Scott Kovac, Nuclear Watch New Mexico, thanked Ms. Gurulé for her work on the
5 NNMCAB. He noted that he would like to request that members of the public be invited on
6 any tours of LANL. Below is written comment submitted by email from Mr. Kovac:

7 “Justice40 is a whole-of-government effort to ensure that Federal agencies work with states
8 and local communities to make good on President Biden’s promise to deliver at least 40
9 percent of the overall benefits from Federal investments in climate and clean energy to
10 disadvantaged communities. Today, we are taking a key step toward achieving the
11 President’s ambitious goal and issuing interim guidance that will help Federal agencies
12 deliver on the Justice40 Initiative.

13 Do we know what percentage of the current benefits from Federal investments in climate
14 and clean energy currently go to disadvantaged communities around Los Alamos?

15 WIPP – GAO report

16 DOE considers 17 shipments per week to WIPP to be full disposal capacity. They are doing 7
17 per week now. We are still dealing with the impacts of 2014 release.

18 The new WIPP ventilation to take 4 years and \$200 million dollars more than original
19 estimate.

20 The causes DOE identified were (1) its contractor's inexperience managing construction
21 projects and (2) an inability to incentivize staff to work in Carlsbad. The contractor’s
22 inexperience had consequences that caused significant schedule delays and cost growth. For
23 example, according to the root cause analysis, the contractor did not properly evaluate
24 subcontractors and awarded a \$135 million construction subcontract to an entity that did
25 not have adequate qualifications to perform certain construction responsibilities for the
26 project.

27 DOE officials acknowledged that the risk register for WIPP lacks details. They explained that
28 DOE plans to update the risk register for WIPP in 2022. Without updating the risk register to
29 include specific risks related to construction and regulatory delays and plan for adequate
30 mitigation strategies, DOE may not have an achievable schedule, which may cause shipping
31 delays and cost increases for the generator sites. DOE may need to ask states for permission
32 to keep storing waste at generator sites, potentially violating legal agreements with the
33 states if DOE cannot obtain their consent for extending the storage and incurring higher
34 storage costs or running out of storage space.

35 I request that the CAB recommend to DOE that DOE provides extreme oversight so that
36 WIPP avoids delays in shipping TRU from LANL in the future, especially since WIPP is due for
37 a new contractor.”

38 With no further public comment Ms. Atcitty closed the comment period at 3:15 p.m.

1 **XIII. Presentation**

2 Mr. David Nickless, EM-LA, Mr. Troy Thomson, N3B, and Mr. Gerald O’Leary, N3B, presented

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7 **XIV. DDFO Follow-Up**

8 Mr. Bishop stated that the following were his notes for the meeting:

- 9 • The Committees need to go back and look at the Bylaws to allow a broader
10 membership.
- 11 • Mr. Bishop will get with Headquarters on the GAO statement in the newspaper
12 article that came out.
- 13 • Per Mr. Grogan’s request, Mr. Bishop will get a waste type presentation (Mr.
14 Rodriguez to give that presentation).
- 15 • Need feedback on the Chairs meeting in Paducah on attending virtually or in person.
- 16 • Staff will get with the members on the snapshot as a progress report and get
17 suggestions on that.
- 18 • April Committee Meeting will be a presentation on Radiological Terms and the Tour
19 of LANL EM Sites will be moved to June.
- 20 • Mr. Bishop will get the percentage of EJ40 going out to disadvantaged communities
21 for EM work. It does exceed 40% right now when you consider working with the
22 Northern New Mexico College Worker Program.
- 23 • Mr. Hull requested a radiological terms presentation – what do the terms mean with
24 regard to risk.
- 25 • Mr. bishop will work with N3B to get a TA-21 (DP Road) Map and a Chromium Map
- 26 • Staff will get a mobile microphone for the presenters.

27
28 **XV. Wrap-up Discussion and Questions**

29 Ms. Atcitty asked Ms. Santistevan to talk about the next meeting and any other
30 announcements she has for the NNMCAB.

31 Ms. Santistevan stated that the next meeting is a Combined Committee Meeting on April 20,
32 2022 from 1:00 to 4:00. She noted that this meeting would be virtual, and the presentation
33 would be a primer on radiological terms and then the committees would discuss their Work
34 Plans. Ms. Santistevan stated that the dates for the Paducah meeting would be May 10th and
35 11th and to let her know if anyone was interested in attending. Ms. Santistevan stated that
36 the NNMCAB would be hosting the EM SSAB Chairs Meeting in Santa Fe the first week of
37 September at La Fonda on the Plaza.

38 Mr. Grogan inquired about the National Cleanup Workshop and would be interested in that
39 meeting.

1 Ms. Santistevan stated that she would send that information out.
