Atomic Spy: The Dark Lives of Klaus Fuchs by Nancy Thorndike Greenspan.

Atomic Spy follows the convoluted and contradictory life of Klaus Fuchs, a brilliant scientist who became one of the most infamous spies in Cold War history.

Sleeper Agent: The Atomic Spy in America Who Got Away by Ann Hagedorn.

Recruited by the Soviets in 1940 for their race to acquire the secrets of the atomic bomb, American-born George Koval used his scientific background to gain assignments at Manhattan Project sites.
