REPORT OF THE

NATIONAL PETROLEUM COUNCIL'S

COMMITTEE ON PETROLEUM TANKER TRANSPORTATION

November 17, 1947

In our report submitted under date of June 10, 1947, we indicated the tanker fleet available in the event of a national emergency. Since that time there has been no substantial change in the carrying capacity of the world tanker fleet. As a matter of fact, it is slightly greater today than it was on March 1, 1947. Your recent request to the Committee indicates that you are presently interested in the availability of tankers for commercial operation after elimination from the total world tanker fleet such vessels as are not normally employed in this service. The Committee has reviewed at some length, statistical data available to it, and we find that the availability of tankers for commercial operation as of this date, consists of 1005 vessels translated in T-2 equivalents. The enclosed statement marked Appendix "A" shows how this tanker availability is arrived at.

It is the view of your Committee that the present shortage of transportation not only in our coastwise trade but worldwide, would probably not have occurred had all of these vessels been in operation. As a matter of information, there remained in tieup as of October 1, 1947 - 100 T-2 tankers together with 37 Liberty type tankers. We understand that citizen and foreign applications now on file with the Maritime Commission, exceed in number the total T-2 tankers owned by the Government, and remaining for sale.

Your Committee is of the opinion that the present acute shortage of transportation could be alleviated, if not completely eliminated, by taking the following steps forthwith:

- 1. Take out of tieup and repair as soon as drydock facilities are available, every T-2 and Liberty type tanker capable of operating after normal repairs.
- 2. Process immediately all applications consistent with the Ship Sales Act of 1946, now pending before the Maritime Commission so as to hasten the transfer of ships to private ownership.
- 3. Continue in effect, the temporary permission granted by the Coast Guard, for emergency deeper loading in Coastwise trade and extend, if possible, such temporary authority in respect to foreign voyages.
- 4. If the Maritime Commission does not have the funds to effect necessary repairs on tankers brought out of layup, they should be furnished such funds.

5. The Merchant Ship Sales Act of 1946 should be amended to extend the operating authority of the U. S. Maritime Commission, thus making it possible to maintain in operating service, those vessels applied and/or contracted for sale but not physically delivered to buyers prior to March 1, 1948.

6. If the Government owned war-built Liberty type tankers are not sold to U. S. citizens pursuant to the Ship Sales Act of 1946, then it is the Committee's viewpoint that the Act should be amended to authorize the sale of this type of

vessels to non-citizens.

In addition to the data mentioned above as Appendiz "A" we also attach certain statistical data, tables numbered 1, 2 and 3, which, while not entirely relevant to the problem of tanker shortage, will undoubtedly be valuable to the Council in bringing up-to-date, the distribution of tanker fleets by flags, as compared to our previous report of June 10th.

The Committee wishes to reiterate that only the immediate placing in operation of vessels now in tieup, will alleviate the present stringent situation.
