PETROLEUM REQUIREMENTS

AUGUST 20, 1948

To the Members of the Military and Government Petroleum Requirements Committee:

Gentlemen:

The Armed Services have recently completed a re-estimation of their requirements during the period July 1, 1948 - December 31, 1948. As a result of these revisions and of offers which have been coming in from the industry, it now appears that all of the requirements for bulk cargoes for this period are covered, with the possible exception of 345,000 barrels of diesel oil on the West Coast later in the year. When and if this estimated requirement becomes firm, specific requests for offers will be made of West Coast refiners.

Coverage of the requirements is based on the assumption that all offers under negotiation as of August 19th will materialize.

Attached is a revised statement of requirements, based on the latest estimates and broken down into bulk cargo and regional requirements. These requirement figures represent the net required from U.S. sources after taking into account all firm offers and contracts from foreign suppliers, both Caribbean and Persian Gulf. Several members of the industry have requested presentation on this basis in order to simplify analysis of domestic area requirements.

As a matter of interest to the Committee members and the industry, a calculation was made of military requirements in relation to refining operations in the areas concerned. Gulf/East Coast requirements were compared with refining runs in Districts I and III, inland requirements with Districts II and IV, and West Coast requirements with District V refining operations.

The total military requirements, including regional, represent the following percentages of refinery runs in these areas:

It should be noted that the attached statement does not include government petroleum requirements for civilian use, which are procured by the Bureau of Federal Supply. Such requirements, now relatively small, will be in addition to military requirements.

We are advised that while <u>bulk cargo</u> requirements for the full period have now been covered by offers, with the exception noted above, this is not necessarily true of all regional requirements. Data on lack of coverage against regional contracts are not yet available. However, there are indications that motor gasoline and heating oil offers in some areas may be inadequate.

It is suggested, therefore, that suppliers re-examine their offers against regional contracts in order that full coverage of regional, as well as bulk cargo requirements, will be obtained promptly.
