TO MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE ON MILITARY AND GOVERNMENT PETROLEUM REQUIREMENTS

Gentlemen:

The Armed Service Petroleum Board, in accordance with its objective of providing maximum assistance to the petroleum industry, has published preliminary estimates of the Armed Services requirements for the Fiscal Year 1949 (July 1, 1948-June 30, 1949).

These requirement figures represent estimates of all major product requirements of the Armed Services including requirements for camps, posts, etc., within the United States which are presently purchased through the Treasury Procurement Service - Bureau of Federal Supply. In the Fiscal Year 1949, all Armed Service requirements will be purchased by Armed Service procurement agencies. This is one of the steps in coordinating and simplifying government petroleum purchases which was recommended by your Committee.

The attached statement shows a comparison of Armed Service requirements for Fiscal Year 1949 compared with Fiscal Year 1948. In total, requirements are now estimated to decline about 4.7 million barrels (3.9%) in the coming fiscal year.

Aviation gasoline requirement estimates (excluding Jet fuel) show an increase of 8%. However, the average requirement for the Fiscal Year 1949 is slightly lower than the average rate for the second half of Fiscal Year 1948 (Jan-June 1948).

Jet fuel requirements are up, but the volume involved (7,000 B/D) is still relatively small.

Motor gasoline, kerosene, other diesel and burner oil and other heavy fuel oil requirements show very little change after taking into account the decreases which will take place in purchases by the Bureau of Federal Supply.

Navy diesel requirements are up slightly.

Navy Special fuel oil requirements are down sharply - 7.8 million barrels (18.5%). This estimate is based on the assumption that Navy Special offers during the next few months will be sufficient to meet the Fiscal 1948 requirement figures which, in turn, are based on reaching target stock levels by June 30, 1948.

A breakdown of the Fiscal Year 1949 requirements by areas is not yet available, but will be forwarded to the Committee as soon as possible.

The anticipated reduction in Armed Services requirements at a time when domestic civilian requirements are still increasing rapidly will no doubt be welcomed by the industry. If it is assumed that Armed Service purchases from foreign supply areas continue at approximately present levels, the domestic Armed Service purchases will not exceed 4% of the total United States demand.

On behalf of the Committee, your Acting Chairman has expressed appreciation to Colonel Vogel, Executive Officer of the Armed Service Petroleum Board, for the actions of the Board in preparing and publishing their estimates well in advance of the Fiscal Year.
