B3.15 Small-scale indoor research and development projects using nanoscale materials Information gathering (including, but not limited to, literature surveys, inventories, site visits, and audits), data analysis (including, but not limited to, computer modeling), document preparation (including, but not limited to, conceptual design, feasibility studies, and analytical energy supply and demand studies), and information dissemination (including, but not limited to, document publication and distribution, and classroom training and informational programs), but not including site characterization or environmental monitoring. Siting, construction, modification, operation, and decommissioning of facilities for smallscale research and development projects; conventional laboratory operations (such as preparation of chemical standards and sample analysis); and small-scale pilot projects (generally less than 2 years) frequently conducted to verify a concept before demonstration actions, provided that construction or modification would be within or contiguous to a previously disturbed or developed area (where active utilities and currently used roads are readily accessible). Not included in this category are demonstration actions, meaning actions that are undertaken at a scale to show whether a technology would be viable on a larger scale and suitable for commercial deployment.

Siting, construction, modification, operation, and decommissioning of facilities for indoor small-scale research and development projects and small-scale pilot projects using nanoscale materials in accordance with applicable requirements (such as engineering, worker safety, procedural, and administrative regulations) necessary to ensure the containment of any hazardous materials. Construction and modification activities would be within or contiguous to a previously disturbed or developed area (where active utilities and currently used roads are readily accessible).

Rationale for determination:

The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) is proposing to provide funding to the University at Buffalo, The State University of New York (UB) to develop highly active and durable platinum-based cathode electrocatalysts and membrane electrode assemblies (MEAs).

Award activities would focus primarily on the synthesis, characterization, and testing of intermetallic catalysts, supports, and nanoparticles to develop reactive oxygen species (ROS) scavengers and composite support for MEA performance. The types of activities associated with the award would include data analysis, computer modeling, design, and laboratory research.

Carbon and precious metal-based materials would be designed and integrated at UB (Buffalo, NY). Synthesis and electrocatalyst characterization would be carried out by Washington University in St. Louis (St. Louis, MO). Pacific Northwest National Laboratory (Richland, WA) would design and synthesize metal oxide radical scavengers. Ballard Power Systems, Inc. (Ballard; Burnaby, BC, Canada) would carry out the design, manufacturing, and testing of fuel cell MEAs.

Award work would be performed at pre-existing facilities that are purpose-built to accommodate the type of laboratory work and testing to be conducted for this award. Facility modifications would be not required.

Award activities would involve handling and use of hazardous materials, including chemicals, solvents, gases, metallic catalysts, polymers, and nanomaterials. Handling, storage, and disposal of such materials would occur within controlled settings and would follow existing policies and procedures, including the handling and disposal of nanoscale materials. Fume hoods would be used when handling gases. Existing health, safety, and environmental policies and procedures would be followed at all facilities to mitigate hazards to acceptable levels, including personnel training, proper personal protective equipment (PPE), engineering controls, monitoring, and internal assessments. Mitigated

hazards would pose negligible risks to the public and environment. All activities would comply with existing federal, state, and local laws and regulations, including the British Columbia Environmental Management Act Hazardous Waste Regulations to be followed by Ballard.

DOE has considered the scale, duration, and nature of proposed activities to determine potential impacts on resources, including those of an ecological, historical, cultural, and socioeconomic nature. DOE does not anticipate impacts on these resources which would be considered significant or require DOE to consult with other agencies or stakeholders.

A diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) plan would be implemented to encourage the inclusion of individuals from underrepresented groups in fields of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM).

Any work proposed to be conducted at a federal facility may be subject to additional NEPA review by the cognizant federal official and must meet the applicable health and safety requirements of the facility.

FOR CATEGORICAL EXCLUSION DETERMINATIONS

The proposed action (or the part of the proposal defined in the Rationale above) fits within a class of actions that is listed in Appendix A or B to 10 CFR Part 1021, Subpart D. There are no extraordinary circumstances related to the proposed action that may affect the significance of the environmental effects of the proposal.

The proposed action has not been segmented to meet the definition of a categorical exclusion. This proposal is not connected to other actions with potentially significant impacts (40 CFR 1508.25(a)(1)), is not related to other actions with individually insignificant but cumulatively significant impacts (40 CFR 1508.27(b)(7)), and is not precluded by 40 CFR 1506.1 or 10 CFR 1021.211 concerning limitations on actions during preparation of an environmental impact statement.

DOE has determined that work to be carried out outside of the United States, its territories and possessions is exempt from further review pursuant to Section 5.1.1 of the DOE Final Guidelines for Implementation of Executive Order 12114; "Environmental Effects Abroad of Major Federal Actions."

The proposed action is categorically excluded from further NEPA review.
