Covered actions would be in accordance with applicable requirements (such as local land use and zoning requirements) in the proposed project area and would incorporate appropriate control technologies and best management practices.

Rationale for determination:

The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) is proposing to provide funding to Forest Preserve District of DuPage County (FPDDC) to install energy efficient windows and doors and a geothermal field at the Willowbrook Wildlife Center (constructed in 2022) in Glen Ellyn, II. The installation of these systems would provide the wildlife center the ability to become energy net zero. Windows, doors, and the geothermal field will be installed as part of an overall facility improvement and expansion plan.

This award will be executed over 2 budget periods and 8 tasks. Activities in Tasks 1 and 2 include gathering permits and procuring contractors for installation of windows, doors, and geothermal components. HVAC systems associated with geothermal heating will be installed in task 3. Task 4 includes the installation of energy efficient windows and doors, 64 geothermal wells, and the associated systems for each. An educational net zero exhibit would be installed in task 6 and tasks 7 and task 8 would include installation closeout, and commissioning and performance monitoring of windows, doors, and geothermal systems.

A third-party contractor will drill 8 geothermal wells per week, 64 total, for a drilling duration of 2 months. Geothermal system piping will take an additional month to install, for a total of 3 months completion time. The geothermal wells and system would be installed on the south and west sides of the to-be constructed rehabilitation clinic and visitor center. All disturbances associated geothermal wells and systems fall within the disturbance boundaries of the improvement and expansion plan of the Willowbrook Wildlife Center.

Well construction and drilling would involve the use of drilling fluids and muds, typical of geothermal well drilling operations. The recipient and third-party drilling operator would be responsible for obtaining the adequate permits for drilling geothermal wells.

Existing corporate health, safety, and environmental policies, procedures, local drill permits, and regulations would be followed, including personnel training, proper personal protective equipment (PPE), engineering controls, monitoring, and internal assessments. Project activities would occur within the disturbance boundaries of the facility improvement and expansion plan; therefore, no adverse impacts to sensitive resources are expected as a result of the proposed activities.

DOE has considered the scale, duration, and nature of the proposed activities to determine potential impacts on sensitive resources, including those of an ecological, historical, cultural, and socioeconomic nature, and found no effects that would be expected to result from the proposed project activities.

EERE is aware of the November 12, 2024, decision in Marin Audubon Society v. FAA, No. 23-1067 (D.C. Cir. Nov. 12, 2024). To the extent that a court may conclude that the Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ) regulations implementing NEPA are not judicially enforceable or binding on this agency action, EERE has nonetheless elected to follow those regulations at 40 C.F.R. Parts 1500-1508, in addition to DOE's procedures/regulations implementing NEPA at 10 C.F.R. Part 1021, to meet the agency's obligations under NEPA, 42 U.S.C. §§ 4321 et seq.

DOE has made a final NEPA determination.

The proposed action is categorically excluded from further NEPA review.
