Minutes 1 2 ı. Call to Order 3 The meeting of the Northern New Mexico Citizens' Advisory Board (NNMCAB) was held on 4 May 17, 2023, in a hybrid format. Mr. Lee Bishop, Deputy Designated Federal Officer (DDFO) 5 stated that on behalf of the Department of Energy (DOE) the meeting of the NNMCAB was called to order at 1:01 p.m. 6 7 Mr. Bishop recognized Ms. Elena Fernandez, the NNMCAB Vice-Chair. Ms. Fernandez 8 presided at the meeting and filled in for Ms. Cherylin Atcitty until she arrived. 9 The meeting of the NNMCAB was posted in The Federal Register in accordance with the 10 Federal Advisory Committee Act. 11 II. **Welcome and Introductions** 12 13 Mr. Bishop welcomed everyone to the meeting and gave a brief safety note on the building 14 exits. Mr. Bishop turned the meeting over to Ms. Fernandez. 15 Ms. Fernandez welcomed everyone to the May Board Meeting at Fuller Lodge in Los Alamos New Mexico. 16 17 III. **Establishment of a Quorum (Roll Call)** 18 19 Ms. Menice Santistevan conducted roll call for board members and guests in person and on 20 WebEx. At the call to order, 11 NNMCAB members were present or online. Ms. Santistevan 21 stated that the meeting was being recorded to produce the minutes of the meeting. 22 IV. 23 **Approval of Agenda** 24 The board reviewed the agenda for the May 19, 2023, meeting. Ms. Fernandez opened the 25 floor to entertain a motion to approve the agenda. 26 Mr. Mark Hayden made a motion to approve the agenda; Mr. Stuart Barger seconded the 27 motion. The motion to approve the agenda as presented passed. 28 29 ٧. **Approval of Minutes** 30 The board reviewed the minutes from the April 19, 2023, Board Meeting. Ms. Fernandez 31 opened the floor to entertain a motion. 32 Mr. Mark Hayden made a motion to approve the minutes as presented; Mr. Jim Murphy 33 seconded the motion. Ms. Fernandez opened the floor for discussion. 34 With no discussion, the motion to approve the minutes passed. 35 36 VI. **Old Business** 37 a. Update from Chair/Vice-Chair 38 Ms. Fernandez, NNMCAB Vice-Chair – Ms. Fernandez stated that she attended that May 39 Technical Working Group (TWG) Meeting that was focused on the overview of N3B 40 projects, she encouraged everyone to attend a TWG meeting. She also virtually

attended the April National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) public meeting on the 1 2 Hexavalent Chromium Plume. 3 b. Update from Subcommittee Chairs 4 Ms. Fernandez thanked Ms. Santistevan for sending out the list of subcommittee 5 membership and asked that each member sign up for a subcommittee. She reminded 6 everyone that all subcommittee meetings are open to the public and are scheduled 7 ahead of time and sent out to the distribution list. 8 **Public Outreach Subcommittee** 9 Ms. Elena Fernandez stated that the subcommittee will schedule a meeting in the 10 coming weeks to go over the plans for the new NNMCAB Website. 11 **Risk Evaluation & Management Subcommittee** 12 Ms. Elena Fernandez stated that the Risk Evaluation and Management Subcommittee will also schedule a meeting in the coming weeks and they tend to meet once a month. 13 14 **Consent Order Subcommittee** 15 Mr. Mark Hayden stated that the Consent Order Subcommittee met May 17th at 9:00 am 16 virtually and they reviewed a new draft recommendation to DOE. The recommendation 17 includes the application of EM-LA's Justice40 through NNMCAB expansion to change the 18 charter to include the entire state, similar to every other advisory board in the nation. 19 Mr. Hayden stated that they would report the minutes shortly. c. Other Items 20 21 Mr. Barger asked if they could get an update on the negotiation on the Chromium 22 plume between EM-LA and NMED. 23 Mr. Mikolanis stated that he would talk about it in his update. 24 d. Consideration and Action on Draft Recommendation 2023-03, "DOE Response, Implementation and Reporting on NNMCAB Recommendations" 25 26 Mr. Hayden gave a summary of the recommendation. Ms. Fernandez opened the floor 27 to entertain a motion. 28 Mr. Mark Hayden made a motion to approve Draft Recommendation 2023-03, Mr. 29 Stephen McLaughlin seconded the motion. The motion to approve Draft 30 Recommendation 2023-03 passed. 31 VII. 32 **New Business** 33 a. Appointment of Nominating Committee 34 Ms. Fernandez asked for two NNMCAB members to volunteer to lead the nominating 35 committee foe next fiscal year's Chair and Vice- Chair positions. The positions are filled 36 once a year. She asked members to contact Ms. Santistevan or volunteer now. Mr. 37 Murphy nominated Mr. Hayden to be on the committee and Mr. Hayden nominated Mr. 38 Murphy to be on the committee, both members agreed to volunteer. Ms. Santistevan 39 stated that anyone serving on the nominating committee is welcome to run for Chair or 40 Vice-Chair. She noted that this would be for the next Fiscal Year beginning October 1st.

Ms. Atcitty and Ms. Fernandez would continue their duties through that day. Ms. 1 2 Santistevan stated that the election of officers would be held at the July Board Meeting. 3 She noted that the NNMCAB would be voting early due to the scheduling of the Chairs 4 Meeting in the Fall so the new officers could attend, and travel could be planned. She 5 asked that any member running for office be able to travel to these meetings to speak 6 on behalf of the Board. Mr. Pacheco stated that he would be happy to help on the nominating committee and he has a copy of the Excel spreadsheet that was used 8 before. 9 b. Other Items 10 Mr. Barger stated that it is his understanding that N3B is in the process of preparing a 11 12 be submitted in September. He noted that as of the last NNMCAB Board meeting Mr. 13

corrective measures evaluation (CME) for Material Disposal Area (MDA) H and it has to Evered requested comments from NNMCAB members by June 1st or June 15th, but the CME is not available for review at this point. He stated that he is not sure how this Board will be able to react in time before the CME is prepared nor how any of the members are qualified to propose corrective measures choices for N3B to consider. He would like some guidance on how to proceed.

Mr. Bishop stated that the best opportunity with the CME is that the input they are looking for is what alternatives would the NNMCAB like DOE to consider in that evaluation. There is the complete spectrum of complete removal, to cap and cover, to strategic removal, and some other creative alternative the Board would like them to consider. Mr. Bishop stated that he could set up a virtual combined subcommittee meeting in the June timeframe to have a discussion. Mr. Bishop stated that in order to get the meeting in the Federal Register the best date for this discussion would be June 28th. The subcommittee meeting was scheduled for June 28, 2023 from 10:00 am to 12:00 noon.

Mr. L'Esperance asked if they could provide a graphic that shows the shafts and the material in the shaft and how it is contained. It would show the hazards involved in removing it.

Mr. Hayden suggested that for the June meeting, to get a balanced view, if the Environment Department of New Mexico could be invited to weigh in and get their perspective on which way they are going. Mr. Bishop stated that he would take that action.

IX. **Public Comment Period**

Ms. Atcitty opened the floor for public comment at 3:02 p.m.

Mr. Kovac, Nuclear Watch New Mexico thanked the Board for working on these complicated problems. He also thanked them for the comment period. Mr. Kovac stated that they

mentioned having a Public Outreach Committee and he finds it interesting that the NNMCAB goes through some length to have public comments at a certain time and it is probably required, but on the other side he finds it hard to find out what the NNMCAB does with the public comments. He noted that the best he can tell is that there is no public record of any of these public comments, if you look at the minutes from April that the public gets there is no minutes included so it is hard for the public to understand where these are going. The minutes are not in the packet and in addition to that public questions are not answered, and public comments are not replied to. Also, in addition to that, the public has no input into the recommendations so he would respectfully request that we look at some of these questions and deal with it in the future.

X. **Update from EM Los Alamos Field Office**

Mr. Mikolanis welcomed the Board members and the members of the public who are attending the meeting both physically and virtually. He stated that for today's update he would like to highlight some recent efforts and priority projects for the legacy cleanup mission.

Hexavalent Chromium Plume – Mr. Mikolanis stated that this is the highest priority in the Environmental Remediation Program. During the last meeting he was at he shared that they had some direction from the State and they are trying to navigate their way through that, but if they couldn't they would get direction to not resume or re-start six of the extraction wells. This came from the Hazardous Waste Bureau. The Groundwater Quality Bureau in the Water Protection Division of New Mexico Environment Department (NMED) gave them direction to shut down all injection which essentially shuts down the Interim Measure (IM) if they didn't do certain things by April 1st. Doe has shut down the IM as of March 31st in compliance with the direction from the Groundwater Quality Bureau and the system remains turned off to this day. As a result of the impasse, nobody likes having the IM off. DOE, NMED and the Pueblo of San Ildefonso had a 3-party summit in March and there have been four of these meetings so far. They will have another one in the coming week where they will put the options on the table and the dialogue continues to be constructive and positive. DOE's objective is to try to bring what additional actions they can do to address both the Groundwater Quality Bureau's concerns and the Hazardous Waste Bureau's concerns and satisfy the objectives the department has for their bias for action to be able to move forward with a remedy sooner. They are working collective and collaboratively with the State and with the Pueblo of San Ildefonso in making these decisions.

Well R-73 – Mr. Mikolanis stated that they were unsuccessful in getting it put in place. The casing broke and they submitted a plug and abandonment plan to the Office of the State Engineer which hey approved. There were some logistical challenges with that, and DOE asked for some extensions and the Office of the State Engineer provided them the extensions. DOE started the plug and abandonment on March 20th. They are making progress in completing the plug and abandonment and are on schedule to complete it by the end of May. Mr. Mikolanis stated that N3B has done a fact-finding causal analysis and will identify corrective actions to prevent the same problem from happening with future well installations.

Aggregate Area Campaign – Mr. Mikolanis stated that this is a high priority for DOE as a result of the settlement agreement with Nuclear Watch New Mexico. There are investigations underway in five Aggregate Areas within two Consent Order Campaigns. This includes investigation and remediation where required, and closure of 200 Solid Waste Management Units and Areas of Concern.

Middle DP Road – Mr. Mikolanis stated that the scope of work is not under the Consent Order. They have completed the cleanup and have been doing the extended condition to demonstrate that they have a clean boundary. They have been chasing a couple of Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) metals and they have one last one they have been chasing, Arsenic. He hopes that the next time the NNMCAB meets hew ill be able to say that the extended condition analyses are done but there are still some things that need to be done. After that, they will be finishing up the written report to NMED. DOE has been engaging with NMED throughout the process and have been following the agreed upon approaches agreed upon.

National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Environmental Assessment – Mr. Mikolanis stated that on May 8th and 9th, the Field Office conducted two meetings to initiate a public scoping period for the NEPA Environmental Assessment (EA) they are doing. This is to cover the Interim Measure, the NEPA coverage for operation of the Chromium Six Plume Interim Measure that expires in December. DOE added some additional scope. As part of the negotiations with the State, one of the things he has mentioned is that the DOE has a bias for action in this case and he would like to move into a final remedy as soon as possible and it will not be possible if the State is not going to accept it. He noted that a presentation with details on the NEPA process and how to submit comments can be viewed on the EM-LA website under "information Center" and subcategory "Presentations". The 30-day public scoping period ends on June 6th.

Strategic Vision – EM-LA is continuing to focus on the Strategic Vision development with support from their contracting partners N3B and Longenecker &Associates. They have conducted numerous Phase 1 and Phase 2 sessions with different engagement groups. They have received a lot of feedback from a west of very diverse stakeholders, elected officials, and members of the public. He is looking forward to getting to Phase 3. They have added some Public Forums in three of the Counties, Los Alamos, Rio Arriba, and Santa Fe. Phase 3 will be the hardest part where they take all the feedback they have received and put it together into guiding principals as they put together a Strategic Vision.

XI. Update and Look Ahead from N3B

Ms. Kim Lebak gave the update for N3B.

Well R-73 – Ms. Lebak stated that they did ship some of those samples off site for an independent laboratory analysis and although they did a root cause analysis on what they knew at he time on R-73, the laboratory could give them information they don't know about and they reserve the right to go back and look at their root cause once they get the lab analysis back on those segments.

They have already submitted two Consent Order Milestones to the NMED for Wells R-79 and R-80. They have three upcoming Consent Order Milestones for this Fiscal Year for water. One is for the IFGMP which is a groundwater monitoring plan and another one is a Chromium report which is due at the end of June. On September 21st they have hopefully

starting on Well R-76, and they will notify NMED on drilling the well and notify them per the 1 2 Consent Order commitment. 3 During this time of year, they are activating their stormwater samplers across the site. There 4 are approximately 200 samplers that they are activating. They activated them in the Spring. 5 As far as cleaning up the soil and the land, Mr. Evered mentioned a couple of the campaigns 6 they have in the Consent Order which are Southern External Boundary and Pajarito 7 Watershed Campaign. Both of these campaigns cover very large areas on the laboratory, 8 and they subdivide them into projects. They are continuing to work on the Southern 9 External Boundary Campaign. Those areas are very large areas and require a lot of sampling. 10 MDA H – The CME Report is due to NMED at the end of September. Earlier in the year they completed MDA L deliverable of the Consent Order Milestone. 11 12 As far as the 30-60 day look ahead for the water and Aggregate Areas, going back to Mr. 13 Barger's comments on the Generals Tanks, they do not have that in the 30-60 day look 14 ahead because it is very complicated. They do hope to start doing some sampling there 15 soon. They hope to complete the R-73 plug and abandonment and are actively working on 16 that. They hope to complete the Middle DP Road field work and then besides the IFGMP and 17 the Chromium Report, they also have deliverable on MDA A and MDA T. They also owe 18 NMED a report on Threemile Canyon. 19 Waste Projects – They are preparing this week their 49th Transuranic (TRU) waste shipment 20 to Waste Isolation Pilot Plant (WIPP). N3B is on the cusp of resuming a campaign in their 21 waste area retrieving corrugated metal pipes (CMPs). Once they resume the activity and 22 exhume the CMPs that have solidified waste in them, they plan to size reduce them for 23 shipment to WIPP. N3B is also working on the Dome re-skinning and are currently working on Dome 49. 24 25 Consent Order – They are simultaneously working on eleven of the seventeen campaigns. 26 They are also doing waste shipping and processing with more to come in the next 30-60 27 days. 28 29 XII. **Update from DDFO** 30 Mr. Bishop gave a preview of the rest of the year. 31 June 21 – LANL tour for NNMCAB members 32 June 28 – Special Combined Subcommittee Meeting (virtual) to discuss MDA H 33 July 19 – Board Meeting at Cities of Gold 34 September – Board Meeting will be in Taos. 35 October 3-5 – EM SSAB Chairs Meeting in Oak Ridge, Tennessee 36 November 6-7 - WIPP Tour in Carlsbad, NM 37 November 15- Board Meeting at Ohkay Owingeh

1 2 XIII. **Wrap-up Discussion** 3 Ms. Atcitty stated that she had a prior commitment and apologized for joining the meeting 4 late. For the wrap up discussion, she asked members to ask questions they didn't get 5 answered or presentation requests they may have. 6 Mr. Pacheco clarified that there would be an update on the Chromium Plan for the June 7 meeting. 8 Mr. Barger stated that he was eagerly awaiting the publication of the EM Newsletter that 9 came this morning to see how the spin doctors would deal with Mr. White's visit to Los 10 Alamos for the public hearing, but he sees that they chose discretion over valor and did not publish anything about that. 11 12 Ms. Atcitty thanked everyone for being at the meeting. She thanked the presenters for all 13 the information and thanked the staff and audio company for their work at the meeting. 14 15 XIV. Adjournment 16 Mr. Bishop thanked everyone for attending the meeting and asked everyone to travel safely down the hill.
