B5.1 Actions to conserve energy or water

(a) Actions to conserve energy or water, demonstrate potential energy or water conservation, and promote energy efficiency that would not have the potential to cause significant changes in the indoor or outdoor concentrations of potentially harmful substances. These actions may involve financial and technical assistance to individuals (such as builders, owners, consultants, manufacturers, and designers), organizations (such as utilities), and governments (such as state, local, and tribal). Covered actions include, but are not limited to weatherization (such as insulation and replacing windows and doors); programmed lowering of thermostat settings; placement of timers on hot water heaters; installation or replacement of energy efficient lighting, low-flow plumbing fixtures (such as faucets, toilets, and showerheads), heating, ventilation, and air conditioning systems, and appliances; installation of drip-irrigation systems; improvements in generator efficiency and appliance efficiency ratings; efficiency improvements for vehicles and transportation (such as fleet changeout); transportation management systems (such as traffic signal control systems, car navigation, speed cameras, and automatic plate number recognition); development of energy-efficient manufacturing, industrial, or building practices; and small-scale energy efficiency and conservation research and development and small-scale pilot projects. Covered actions include building renovations or new structures, provided that they occur in a previously disturbed or developed area. Covered actions could involve commercial, residential, agricultural, academic, institutional, or industrial sectors. Covered actions do not include rulemakings, standard-settings, or proposed DOE legislation, except for those actions listed in B5.1(b) of this appendix.

(b) Covered actions include rulemakings that establish energy conservation standards for consumer products and industrial equipment, provided that the actions would not:

1. Have the potential to cause a significant change in manufacturing infrastructure (such as construction of new manufacturing plants with considerable associated ground disturbance);
2. involve significant unresolved conflicts concerning alternative uses of available resources (such as rare or limited raw materials);
3. have the potential to result in a significant increase in the disposal of materials posing significant risks to human health and the environment (such as RCRA hazardous wastes); or
4. have the potential to cause a significant increase in energy consumption in a state or region.

Rationale for determination:

The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) is proposing to provide funding to Marion County School District to perform energy efficiency upgrades at 12 schools in Marion County, South Carolina. This funding opportunity is part of a DOE initiative to execute high-impact energy efficiency and health improvements as well as innovative energy technology packages in K-12 schools across the country.

Project activities include LED lighting upgrades, transformer replacements, roof replacements, HVAC system upgrades, and building automation control upgrades at various schools. Project activities would occur at the following schools: Mullins High School, Easterling Primary School, Creek Bridge STEM Academy, Marion Intermediate School, Johnakin Middle School, Palmetto Middle School, Academy for Careers, North Mullins Primary School, McCormick Elementary School, Success Academy at Palmetto Education Center, Academy of Early Learning, and Marion High School.

Formal consultation with the South Carolina State Historic Preservation Office (SC SHPO) was initiated by the recipient, with a SC SHPO responses provided on September 26th, 2025. The email from the SC SHPO stated that the project activities are exempt from Section 106 review per the DOE Programmatic Agreement with the SC SHPO and that nothing is further needed by their office. If the scope of the undertaking changes or if the undertaking cannot be completed as proposed in the application submitted and reviewed, consultation under Section 106 should be reinitiated with the SC SHPO.

Wetland and waterway areas would be avoided during field activities and no impacts to aquatic resources, including floodplains, are expected through project implementation.

The proposed project activities include upgrading LED lighting, transformer replacements, roof replacements, HVAC system upgrades, and building automation control upgrades. These activities present typical construction-related safety hazards such as working at heights (e.g., using ladders or lifts), exposure to electrical components, minor excavation and trenching for conduit runs, and the temporary use of construction materials including adhesives, wiring, and low-VOC sealants. The recipient would adhere to all applicable federal, state, and local health, safety, and environmental regulations.

Any changes to the project activities or locations are subject to additional NEPA review by DOE and are not authorized for federal funding unless and until the Contracting Officer provides written authorization on those additions or modifications. Any and all permits required for the execution of the project at the above-referenced locations would be the responsibility of the recipient.

DOE has considered the scale, duration, and nature of proposed activities to determine potential impacts on resources, including those of an ecological, historical, cultural, and socioeconomic nature. DOE does not anticipate impacts on these resources which would be considered significant or require DOE to consult further with other agencies or stakeholders.

NEPA PROVISION

DOE has made a final NEPA determination.

1- The SHPO stated that the proposed project activities are exempt from Section 106 review per the DOE Programmatic Agreement with the SC SHPO and that nothing is further needed by their office. However, if the scope of the undertaking changes or if the undertaking cannot be completed as proposed in the application submitted and reviewed by the SC SHPO, their offices should be contacted for guidance on reinitiating consultation under Section 106.

2- Marion County School District is required to submit an annual historic preservation report on the MS Forms website summarizing all award undertakings and SHPO reviews occurring from September 1st through August 31st.
