Environmental Management: A National Responsibility

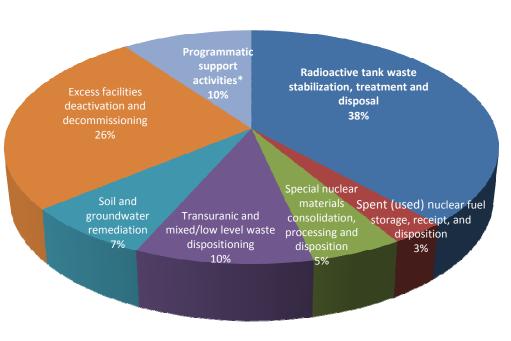
- We reduce risks and protect our workers, our communities and the environment through cleanup
- Our work is urgent and essential to the health and economic vitality of our communities and the nation and positions our Sites for future missions and use
- Our mission is not discretionary it is a congressional mandate to D&D the gaseous diffusion plant under the U.S. Energy Policy Act of 1992 and a federal obligation to address the cold war environmental legacy cleanup and honor our regulatory commitments
- > Time is not on our side costs and risks increase over time
- We have demonstrated value for the American Taxpayer by delivering significant progress in the past several years in reducing risks and the overall liability - but our work is not done
- The Environmental Management portfolio is one of our nation's largest liabilities we have a responsibility to relieve future generations of this environmental and financial liability



Program Priorities

- Activities to maintain a safe, secure, and compliant posture in the EM complex
- Radioactive tank waste stabilization, treatment, and disposal
- Spent (used) nuclear fuel storage, receipt, and disposition
- Special nuclear material consolidation, processing, and disposition
- Transuranic and mixed/low-level waste disposition
- Soil and groundwater remediation
- Excess facilities deactivation and decommissioning (D&D)

"To-Go Life-Cycle Costs" (\$185B - \$218B as of the FY 2012 Request)



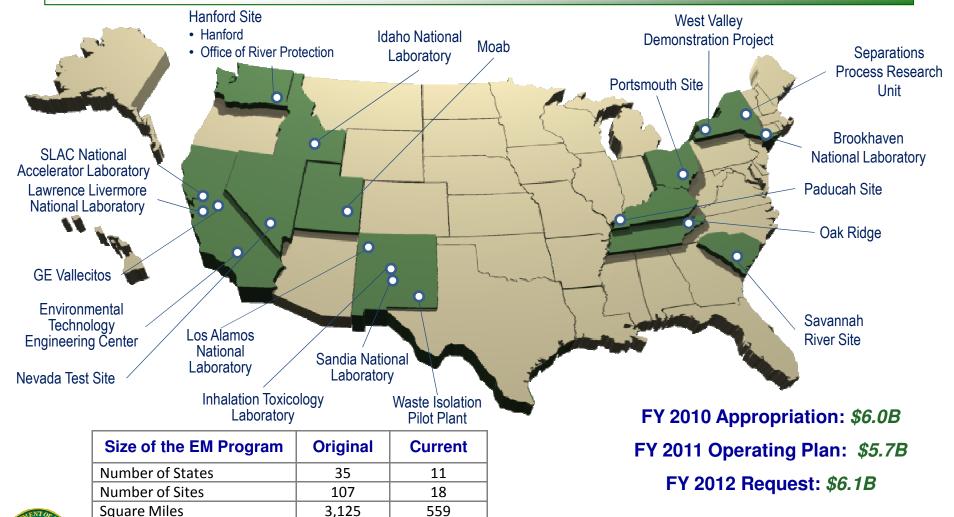

Compliance Posture

- Funds activities to maintain a safe and secure posture in the EM complex
- Now, after two decades EM and its regulators operate in a mature programmatic and regulatory setting
- Regulators and stakeholder relationships are sophisticated
 - Cost and scope is well understood
 - Structure of regulatory agreements vary from state to state
 - Real expectation that the Department will deliver on its commitments
 - Legal remedies available to regulators
- > To fulfill the requirements of Executive Order 12088, EM must submit a request to cover the costs of environmental compliance requirements in its OMB budget request

Tank waste retrievals at Hanford and Savannah River





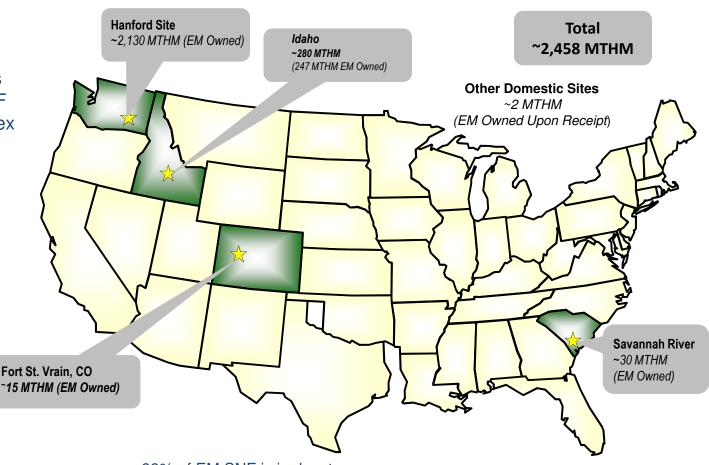

More than 2,400 Metric Tons Heavy Metal (MTHM) of SNF is located across the Complex

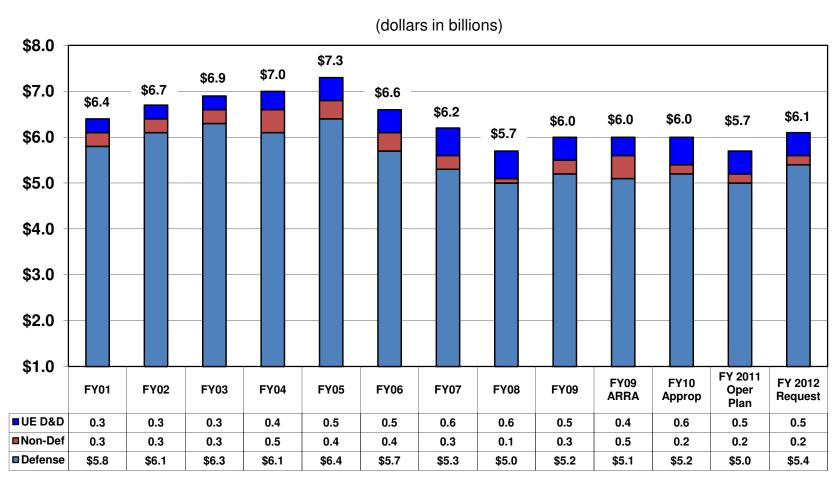
- DOE Production and R&D Reactors

EM Funding History: Levelized in Recent Years





FY 2011 Operating Plan -- \$5.7B

- President signed into Law on 4/15/11, Public Law 112-10
- Historical Continuing Resolution (CR) rules applied for more than half of the fiscal year – no new starts or terminations
- Seven (7) CR periods limited access to full funding
- The Department submitted its FY 2011 Operating Plan May 18, 2011 consistent with the provisions contained in the public law and at a level of detail below the appropriation
- > FY 2011 Operating Plan reflects the close cooperation of all our sites to ensure they are positioned to meet compliance milestones while balancing workforce requirements with our on-going mission



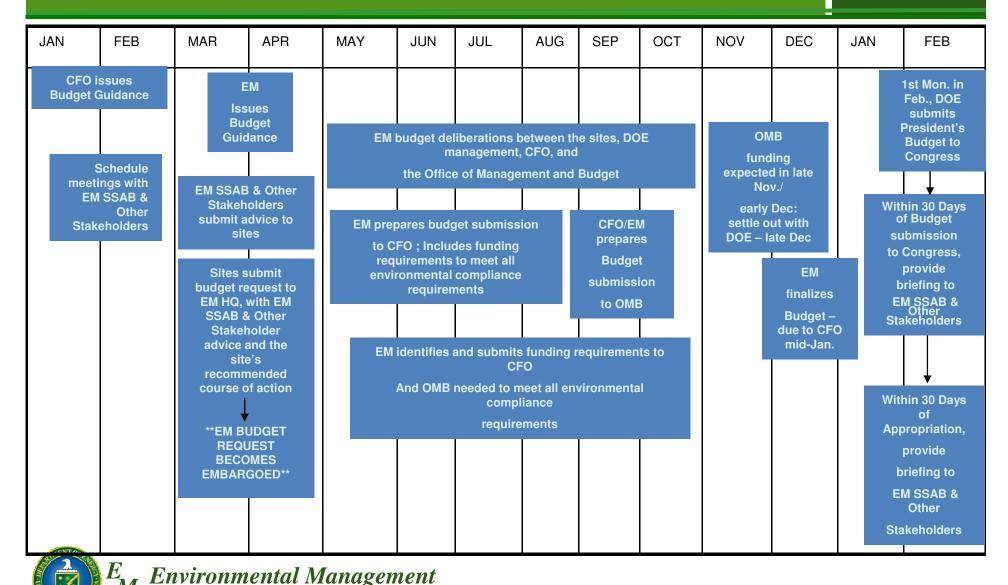

- > February 14, 2011: President's Request delivered to Congress
- March 30, 2011, SSAB Guidance was signed out by EM-2
- March 31, 2011: EM-1 testified to HEWD
- > April 1, 2011: Budget Formulation Planning for FY 2013 kick-off with sites
- June 1, 2011: HEWD initial mark by appropriation level totaling \$5.6B with final mark expected on June 15 including lower-level activities

FY 2013 Formulation Process

- > EM HQ sends 5-year targets to the field sites (BY +4)
- EM field managers brief HQ leadership on funding strategy and program requirements
- Field sites develop Integrated Priority Lists (IPLs)
- > EM HQ conducts corporate review and analyses and develop crosscutting information for S-3 consideration
- > EM transmits budget to OMB, receives Passback, and appeals if necessary
 - ✓ EM budget request must comply with E.O. 12088
- > EM HQ develops congressional budget and leads effort with field sites to develop appropriate messaging for rollout
