- 1. **W**hereas, Alaska LNG contends, "In the context of an Alaska-based Project... the proposed export is not inconsistent with the public interest." i
- 2. Whereas, The Russian federal government has granted the Russian independent gas producer Novatek a license to export liquefied natural gas. UPI reported, "The Yamal LNG project has the capacity to produce about 16.5 million tons of natural gas and exports could target consumers in the Far East. As many as 16 ice-class carriers will be designated to ship LNG year-round to global consumers". "
- 3. Whereas, There are influential members of Congress who believe that the above action on the part of the Russian Federation will, "Embolden Russia's position in Ukraine since it makes Russia less reliant on selling natural gas to Europe, and a threat to cut off supplies or raise prices significantly could pressure Western European countries to lift their [economic] sanctions".iii The same members of Congress want, "The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) to expedite its sluggish LNG (liquefied natural gas) export approval process so the U.S. could export more natural gas".iv

- 4. **W**hereas, Economic sanctions against nations are acts of war.
- 5. Whereas, Prima face evidence exists (e.g. Victoria Nuland's statements and recorded phone conversations with Ambassador Pyatt) which demonstrates the February 22, 2014, overthrow of the elected government of the Ukraine was a coup d'état, an act of Unconventional Warfare (i.e. Complex Operations, Political Warfare) directed and financed (\$5 billion plus) through the United States Department of State (DoS).
- 6. Whereas, A leading percentage of the Ukrainian "partners" involved in the DoS's Complex Operations as well as the subsequent government have ties to anti-ethnic-Russian / anti-Semitic parties, causing ethnic Russian peoples of Eastern Ukraine to seek separation from the Ukraine and incorporation into the Russian Federation, resulting in a U.S. sanctioned Ukraine government war against ethnic Russians in eastern Ukraine.
- 7. Whereas, This "Application for Authorization To Export" evidently has been filed, concurrently with, or pursuant of the actions of the Russian Federation as stated in item 2 above. Thus the "Application", in itself, can be classified as an act of economic warfare.
- 8. Whereas, In a pretext of economic development, the State of Alaska, the University of Alaska, and several municipalities (e.g. Fairbanks North Star Borough) have been working in partnership with the Department of Defense, the FAA, the Department of Homeland Security, as well as military weapons systems contractors (e.g. Lockheed Martin, Northrop Grumman, and General Atomics) (aka the military industrial complex (MIC)) to integrate military Intelligence Surveillance and Reconnaissance (ISR) systems into Alaskan civil airspace.
- 9. Whereas, ISR systems are: a threat to civil liberties, a violation of the Constitution of the State of Alaska (Section 22 Right of Privacy), as well as instruments of war that can be turned on the civilian population of the State of Alaska to monitor and control us. (See Exhibit A, my petition to the State of Alaska.)
- 10. **W**hereas, The Fairbanks North Star Borough administration, again in the pretext of economic development, is using the Alaska LNG Project in its calculus to advance the "BOROUGH EFFORTS TO INCREASE MISSIONS AT EIELSON AIR FORCE BASE AND FORT WAINWRIGHT ARMY POST,

SUPPORT FOR JOINT PACIFIC ALASKA RANGE COMPLEX TRAINING AREA IMPROVEMENTS, RESPOND TO FEDERAL ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT STATEMENT ACTIONS RELATING TO BASE ASSIGNMENT OF THE PACIFIC AIR FORCES F-35 [a tactical nuclear weapon] SQUADRONS, AND WAIVING TITLE 16 [Ethics in contracting] REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL EXPENDITURES OF THOSE FUNDS". (Exhibit – B FNSB Ordinance 2013-20-2K and Exhibit – C Mayor's Report)

- 11. **W**hereas, Alaska: is located in close geographic proximity to the Russian Federation, has a significant population of Russian speaking people with direct familial ties to Russia, and there are several Russian communities in close proximity to the proposed pipeline as well as its terminus.
- 12. Whereas, Since all warfare is based on deception; fear and hate rule. These emotions replace civility, humanity, love of neighbor, as well as critical thinking. This places our ethnic Russian sisters and brothers in the dangerous position of potentially being inmates of a high tech surveillance concentration camp.
- 13. Whereas, Lt. General Bradley Heithold, USAF, Vice Commander U.S. Special Operations Command In April 2012, speaking at a conference titled Non-Traditional ISR said, "What we do, we hunt people. When you hunt people you got to put sensors and the ability [to use them] on the aircraft... With high definition sensors you can tell the guy who walks with an elongated gate. You can look at the guy that wears red shoes. You can look at the guy that wears a red turban and a tan uniform. You can get the intelligence of what they wear and you can find those people and kill them." Later in his presentation he was asked, "What keeps you up at night General?" He answered, "I can do pretty good at hunting when I'm not in the Continental United States (CONUS). Unfortunately Congress ties our hands. The law ties our hands. We can't do as good at hunting here." The Department of defense considers Alaska Outside the Continental U.S.
- 14. Whereas, In contrast to Alaska LNG's contention that, "[T]he proposed export is not inconsistent with the public interest", barring the monied interests of the MIC and the Energy Oligarchy (to include parties of Alaska LNG LLC), war has never been in the public interest. Economic warfare, on some level or another, always reverts to violent kinetic warfare. Fear that this scenario would untie the hands of General Heithold and his ilk are not unwarranted. Turning Alaska into a battleground or a hi-tech surveillance dystopia is definitely not in our public interest.

- I request that FE call on the Congress of the United States of America to III. initiate an independent investigation into DoS's Political Warfare activities regarding the overthrow of the elected government of Ukraine as well as the financial, energy, and other corporate influences involved.
- IV. I request that FE issue no Long Term Authorization To Export Liquefied Natural Gas Produced From Domestic Natural Gas Resources (the action) until such time as the completion of said investigation as described in item III above is completed; a full transparent disclosure is published and made available to all Americans; and Alaskans having been duly informed on the origin and the possible consequences of the action have the opportunity to vote on its approval.

A Petition to the State of Alaska Public Offices Commission and State Ombudsman: requesting remedy from threats to our basic human right of privacy, as guaranteed by the Constitution of the State of Alaska Section 22; and requesting an investigation into conflicts of interest of the constituent members of the Alaska Legislative Task Force on Unmanned Aircraft Systems (LTFUAS) and their chairperson Representative Shelly Hughes.

Whereas unmanned aircraft systems (*UAS*), including their component subsystems (e.g. unmanned aerial vehicles (*UAV* aka drones), sensors, ground control stations, associated computers, software, and data storage), since their origin, have had military application (e.g. persistent intelligence, surveillance, and reconnaissance (*ISR*) and targeted killing aka assassination) as their primary function.

Whereas *Persistent ISR Technologies are oppressive invasions of privacy,* including synthetic aperture radar (*SAR*) that can track a human through triple canopy forest; LASER based radar (*LIDAR*) that can create high definition images of your home, including through your windows; to Full Motion Video that can lock in on you and track your movements; and Process Exploitation and Dissemination (*PED*) systems that memorize past scans, compare them to current data, and decide automatically if you are an "enemy".

Whereas integrating these systems, into our airspace, when placed into the context of a military conflict with Russia, may produce an existential constitutional threat to a large ethnic segment of our State's population.

Whereas "We the People" of the State Alaska, recognizing the inherent dangers posed by the intrusion of modern high technology into our private lives, amended our State's Constitution in 1972 by adding Section 22.

Section 22. Right of Privacy

The right of the people to privacy is recognized and shall not be infringed. The legislature shall implement this section.

Whereas, to afford Alaskans a stricter protection of their inherent rights, Section 22 purposely omitted language from the Fourth Amendment of the Constitution of the United States of America (i.e. unreasonable). This language can be construed as a citizen's "reasonable" expectation of privacy, given the existence of and the availability of advanced technology, circumventing the unreasonableness of the act of invasion itself.

Whereas Representative Shelley Hughes and LTFUAS have, in public statements as well as LTFUAS documents, made policy decision recommendations contrary to the Constitution of the State of Alaska, Section 22. Right of Privacy.

Whereas at least three members of LTFUAS operate commercial businesses that stand to profit from decisions made by the task force.

 \mathbf{W} hereas two of these three members of LTFUAS have, in the month of October, held fundraisers for the election campaign of the LTFUAS chairperson, Representative Shelly Hughes.

 ${f W}$ hereas the rest of the membership of LTFUAS is largely made up of stakeholders representing: various state regulatory bodies, the Department of Homeland Security, the Department of Public Safety, a retired brigadier general / former commander of NORAD. There is only one member supposedly representing the public who has neither the means nor has shown the inclination to gather the consensus of the population of the State of Alaska.

Whereas LTFUAS has never included an advocate for constitutional privacy issues.

Whereas Section 22. Right of Privacy is a constitutionally guaranteed right. It is not an adjunct of state commercial or industrial policy.

 \mathbf{W} hereas this right was specifically written into the Constitution of the State of Alaska as a constitutional amendment sanctioned by majority vote of the citizens of the State of Alaska:

Therefore I respectfully petition this body to:

- 1. Seek an injunction halting further activity on behalf of the integration of Unmanned Aircraft Systems into Alaskan airspace by LTFUAS, the Alaska State Legislature, the University of Alaska Fairbanks's Alaska Center for Unmanned Systems Integration, and the Fairbanks North Star Borough.
- 2. Initiate an investigation into issues of malfeasance and conflict of interest involved in the operation of LTFUAS to include but not limited to fundraising efforts of members of LTFUAS on behalf of Representative Shelly Hughes.
- 3. If the action is outside the legal jurisdiction of this department, please submit this petition to the proper authorities and or direct me to the proper authorities so that I may proceed from there.

- These are military systems, and have been from the start. The Predator drone, a Defense Advanced Projects Agency (DARPA) funded design, had its first application in the war in the Balkans. The drone's primary application has been to serve as a platform for sensors, computers, and satellite links in the performance of persistent Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance (ISR). Shortly after September 11, 2001, the CIA was given the green light, in the words of CIA's Counter Terrorism Center chief Cofer Black, to "take the gloves off" and arm the Predator with Hellfire missiles. Since then the drone has been used as a tool of assassination, killing thousands of human beings. Most of these are not high-level officers of the Taliban or al-Qaeda, they are largely civilians, hundreds are children.
- Persistent ISR Technologies are oppressive invasions of privacy, including synthetic aperture radar (SAR) that can track a human through triple canopy forest; LASER based radar (LIDAR) that can create high definition images of your home, including through your windows; to Full Motion Video that can lock in on you and track your movements; and Process Exploitation and Dissemination (PED) systems that memorize past scans, compare them to current data, and decide automatically if you are an "enemy".

By law, the Fairbanks North Star Borough's drone "Tech Park" is a military facility. Mayor Luke Hopkins, General Ro Bailey (Ret.) director of the Pan Pacific US Test Range Complex have been trumping up supposed civilian uses while not revealing actual military ISR applications. The recently passed Military Facility Zone (MFZ) law being used for its development: will afford the worlds largest military contractors (e.g. Lockheed Martin, Northrop Grumman, General Atomics, etc.) tax-free use of

• **Borough land**; provide them with infrastructure improvements; and provide them with preferred low interest loans. You will be handed the bill because these perks are to be paid for by the Alaskan Industrial Development and Import Authority. Mayor Hopkins calls this a paradigm economic opportunity, part of the University of Alaska test site integrating civilian use of unmanned systems. But the language of the MFZ is explicit:

Sec. 26.30.020.(a) The adjutant general may designate an area as a military facility zone only if the area in the state... **directly supports the military application of a facility.**

- The National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) for fiscal year 2010 (Pub. L. No. 111-84, 123 Stat. 2190 (2009)). Section 935 of 2010 NDAA states that "The Secretary of Defense and the Secretary of Transportation shall, after consultation with the Secretary of Homeland Security, jointly develop a plan for providing expanded access to the national airspace system for unmanned aircraft systems of the Department of Defense."
- The NDAA for fiscal year 2012 and the FAA Modernization and Reform Act of 2012 Public Law 112-95 (FMRA) directed the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA): to develop a plan for integrating unmanned aircraft systems into the National Airspace (NAS) by 2015; and to set up six test ranges in the U.S. to implement said integration. FMRA also directed the FAA to "consult with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the Department of Defense," in determining the location of six test ranges for the development of drones.

"[T]he FAA has indicated that they are working 'in coordination with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration ("NASA") and the Department of Defense ("DoD")."ⁱⁱ

"The roles of NASA and the DoD in the test site and operation process have never been publically clarified." $^{\rm iii}$

- The 2012 NDAA also assigned the military the authority to arrest U.S. citizens, inside the U.S., on suspicion of having links to "terrorist" organizations and hold them indefinitely. Is this a coincidence? Are they related? The same mindset?

According to the U.S. Energy Information Administration's International Energy Outlook 2013, iv Russia is the United States' closest competitor in the international market of natural gas, with projections for 2040 showing the U.S. production at 33.1 and Russian at 33.3 trillion cubic feet. Considering that: Alaska appears to be headed toward the implementation of a "large" natural gas pipeline to compete in this market; the U.S. and N.A.T.O. have been, for decades enclosing Russia in a ring of intercontinental ballistic missiles; the government of Ukraine recently experienced a U. S. government backed "pro-west" coup d'état; the people of Crimea elected to leave the Ukraine and join the Russian Federation; the U.S. government continues to sabre rattle and has led the economic sanctions (an act of war) against Russia; Alaska is in geographically close proximity to Russia; could the "integration" of unmanned surveillance systems into the Alaskan airspace be part of a projected military plan making our State a potential battlefield? Alaska has a large population of Russian speaking people. Could the implementation of this program have the effect of creating a high tech virtual internment camp for our Russian citizens?

Rep. Hughes / Alaska Legislative UAS Task Force Violate Their Oath of Office

By Rob Mulford:

"At this table, in this room right now, we have some of the most educated people about this sector [Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) industry] in this State, but as soon as you go beyond that it quickly turns into blank stares... This isn't meant to be a prescriptive strategic plan ... [But] somebody's going to take a leadership role. I think, based on investments, people want more money and skin in the game. A lot of us are going to dictate where and how this really plays out commercially". – Joe Jacobson, Alaska Department of Commerce, Community Economic Development. iv

But Joe, it is a prescriptive strategic plan, the latest chapter of an old racket with a sexy new high-tech veneer; something which General Butler explained, "[l]s conducted for the benefit of the very few, at the expense of the very many". This time the losses will be reckoned in sacred rights. It is my hope to illuminate minds and change those blank stares to eyes of discernment focused for critical examination.

We are taught that the first ten amendments of the Constitution of the United States of America are bulwarks against government abuse that our Supreme Court wields in our defense. Concepts expressed in a Congressional Research Service (CRS) report, titled *Drones in Domestic Surveillance Operations: Fourth Amendment Implications and Legislative Responses*^{iv}, may prove these assumptions Pollyannaish at best and fatal misconceptions at worst.

One of these emanates from language in the Fourth Amendment itself: "The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated". Reasonable being the operative word, the court, since the early 20th century, has diverted its focus away from the reasonableness of the search to a subject's assumed expectation of privacy in a technically advanced culture.

"Justice Scalia... remarked on this trend: 'It would be foolish to contend that the degree of privacy secured to citizens by the Fourth Amendment has been entirely unaffected by the advance of technology. For example, ... the technology enabling human flight has exposed to public view (and hence, we have said, to official observation) uncovered portions of the house and its curtilage that once were private. The question we confront today is what limits there are upon this power of technology to shrink the realm of guaranteed privacy." Is a personal right really diminished by an offender's potential ability to violate it?

A PETITION FOR REMEDY OF RIGHTS THREATENED BY AND CONFLICTS OF INTEREST OF REPRESENTATIVE SHELLY HUGHES AND THE ALASKA LEGISLATIVE TASK FORSE ON UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEMS.

"Justice Alito, joined by three other Justices in his *United States v. Jones* concurrence, likewise observed: 'The Katz test rests on the assumption that this hypothetical reasonable person has a well developed and stable set of privacy expectations. But technology can change those expectations. Dramatic technological change may lead to periods in which popular expectations are in flux and may ultimately produce significant changes in popular attitudes. New technology may provide increased convenience or security at the expense of privacy, and many people may find the tradeoff worthwhile. And even if the public does not welcome the diminution of privacy that new technology entails, they may eventually reconcile themselves to this development as inevitable." [Emphasis mine.] Is a personal right diminished by an offender's potential ability to violate it?

In December of 2010 I attended the Unmanned Aerial Vehicle Payloads Summit in Washington DC where I was briefed on technologies of modern warfare including: synthetic aperture radar that can track a human through triple canopy forest; LASER based radar (LIDAR) that can create high definition images of your home and its surroundings; Full Motion Video that can lock in on you and track your movements; and Process Exploitation and Dissemination (PED) systems that memorize past scans, compare them to current data, and decide automatically if you are an enemy. All these could be accurately described as tools for totalitarian oppression.¹

Senior program managers for the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency (DARPA) led two of the briefings. iv After showing off their projects they spoke of changing the business model of Department of Defense (DoD) sensor system acquisition to "one where you [Industry] produce these systems (with DoD investment) more like Apple produces IPhones, because the technology is moving so fast and traditional methods of development can't keep up." They offered beta copies of software for further military as well as commercial development. The result has been a near concurrent development of military applications in the commercial world.

The above CRS report states, "Based on existing case law, it is reasonable to assume that surveillance of an individual while in his home—an area accorded the greatest Fourth Amendment protection—using technology not in general public use would be an unlawful search absent a search warrant." Will the commercialization of military surveillance technologies make the Fourth Amendment moot?

Possibly by premonition and prompted by fear of the potential for misuse of computerized information systems, Alaskans added Section 22. Right of Privacy to our state Constitution. It states, "The right of the people to privacy is recognized and shall not be infringed. The legislature shall implement this section." Leaving out language like the word reasonable protects us from those who might twist its meaning. It is explicit.

Ignoring their oath of office, "Task Force" Chair. Representative Shelly Hughes and her "Task Force" continue pushing for the integration of these oppressive technologies into our airspace. Legislative Task Force on Unmanned Aircraft Systems Interim Report to the Legislature dated January 15, 2014, states, "As technology continues to advance beyond "normal" application of current laws, a balanced approach that recognizes the inherent difficulty in predicting the future must be adopted when drafting new laws. The LTFUAS [Legislative Task Force on Unmanned Aircraft Systems] determined that we cannot foresee the future applications of technology (of UAS or other technologies); therefore, creating restrictions in law based on assumptions is not recommended." What part of "The right of the people to privacy is recognized and shall not be infringed" do they not understand?

They say that existing law including the newly passed HB 255, regulating the use of drones in State and local law enforcement, will protect us from nefarious uses. But HB 255 will not protect anyone from violation of their rights if the Military or companies contracted to the so-called Intelligence Community operate these devices. Federal law would trump State law and the Supreme Court defers to the federal executive in all matters that that branch labels as national security.

Ineffective as HB 255 is in the protection of our privacy, Michael Toscano, of the Association of Unmanned Vehicle Systems International (AUVSI) must see it as a sign that Alaska is not enthusiastic enough for these systems, coloring the State blue in a presentation that he delivered to the Alaska Unmanned Systems Interest Group annual meeting this September. He upset the members of the "Task Force" so they hatched out a response at their September 19th meeting in Anchorage. The plan is to write Mr. Toscano, getting the Governor to sign on, assuring him that "we are not anti UAS" and "Alaska's skies are open for business". Rep. Hughes said, "I believe that when you are addressing those privacy concerns and when you are setting the parameters and putting in statute what the expectation is for public safety, that is not being anti-UAS. It's reassuring the public. It's part of that "social license" so that industry can move forward."^{IV}

So there you have it. This is not about privacy. It's about exercising a "social license" to "assure" the public so the Surveillance Industry can move forward. As far as the "skin in the game" that Commissioner Jacobson mentioned earlier is concerned, three members of the "UAS Task Force" operate business that could stand to handsomely profit from its recommendations. On October 3rd, Two of these, Steve Colligan and Steve Wackowski have even held a fundraiser for Rep. Hughes at Colligan's E-Terra office. It is this a conflict of interest? Talk about skin!

Let's revoke Rep. Hughes social license. Keep the drones out of our skies.


