"Be Safe, Take Your Time When Driving in Winter Conditions. Plan Ahead Allow Plenty of Extra Time for Your Transit" It's that time of year again. Winter is upon us and the roads can be difficult, especially during that morning commute. Here are some tips for winter driving.

1. Decrease your speed and leave at least three times more space than usual between you and other cars.

- 2. Don't use cruise control on icy roads, the vehicle attempting to maintain speed can cause skidding.
- 3. Use low gears to keep traction.
- Brake gently to avoid skidding, if your wheels start to skid, ease off the brake.
- 5. Keep your lights on to increase visibility.

6. Make sure that your car is in good operating condition.

Be prepared for an emergency, it's a good idea to carry the following items in your vehicle.

- 1. Jumper Cables or Jumper Pack
- 2. Tire Chains
- 3. Bag of salt or cat litter
- 4. Shovel
- 5. Flashlight (make sure the batteries are in good condition)
- 6. First Aid Kit
- 7. Ice scraper with snow brush
- 8. Reflective Triangles
- 9. High-energy foods such as energy bars, nuts, hard candy, or dried fruits
- 10. Water

## What is the Northern New Mexico Citizen's Advisory Board (NNMCAB)?

Environmental Management Site-Specific Advisory Boards were developed to involve stakeholders more directly in the Department of Energy (DOE) cleanup process. The NNMCAB provides DOE with advice and recommendations concerning: environmental remediation, waste management, and monitoring and surveillance of legacy waste at LANL.

#### Who Serves on the NNMCAB?

Membership reflects a broad range of cultures, demographics, and views from citizens in the affected communities and regions. Members include stakeholders from local governments, Tribal Nations, environmental and civic groups, universities, labor organizations, and others. Liaisons to the NNMCAB come from LANL, DOE, the Environmental Protection Agency, and the New Mexico Environment Department.

#### **Board Member Responsibilities**

\* Submitting advice and recommendations to DOE on integral Environmental Management Issues.

- \* Representing and communicating the views of their communities in board discussions.
- \* Keeping the public informed on key issues, upcoming decisions, board recommendations, and public hearings.
- \* Attending the NNMCABs bi-monthly meetings and serving on one of the boards standing committees. Board meetings occur Bi-monthly on Wednesdays from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Committee meetings occur on the 2nd Wednesday of every month from 2:00p.m. to 4:00 p.m.

#### How Can You Get Involved?

Board meetings serve as a two-way exchange between members of the public and the NNMCAB, DOE, and Liaisons. All NNMCAB board meetings have a public comment period through which members of the public can voice their concerns, and submit written comments.

At this time the Board is focused on recommendations relating to the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant and Fiscal Year 2016 Federal Clean-up Budget for Los Alamos National Laboratory (LANL). In December 2014 The NNMCAB held a special meeting regarding the transition of LANL clean-up. The members will continue monitoring the transition of LANL clean-up work from the National Nuclear Security Administration to the Office of
