Why we did a Strategic Energy Plan

- Missed opportunities
- ► Focus our efforts
- Streamline development process

Our Timeline

<u>September 22</u>: Attended National Tribal Energy Summit D.C.

October 12: Contacted Liz Doris - NREL

November: Gathered energy data

Dec. 1-2: Two day planning session at Choctaw

Dec. 3: Two-page plan summary received from NREL

Jan. 5: Received 1st draft of Strategic Energy Plan (20 pages)

Jan. 15: Tribal Council adopted Strategic Energy Plan

Data Gathered in Advance

- ► <u>Electrical usage</u>: kWh usage for 12 months (major loads) w/ sample bills
- ► <u>Electrical contracts</u>: copies of electrical contracts (majors)
- Propane: gallons purchased and price paid for 12 months
- Energy audits: copies of all recent energy audits
- ► Tribal housing: Map of housing units with quantity
- Fleet: Tribal vehicle fleet list and vehicle fuel type
- Natural gas: financial analysis that had been done related to converting from LP gas to Natural Gas

Stakeholder Participants

- Coordinator (1): Economic Development Director
- Core Team (6): Chief of Staff, Development Director, Economic Development Director, Public Works Director, Choctaw Electrical General Manager, Housing Development Coordinator
- Elected Officials (18): Tribal Chief and Tribal Council
- <u>Key Stakeholders (30)</u>: Housing, Schools, Casinos, Natural Resource, Hospital, Environmental, Tribal Administration, Forestry, Finance, Legal, Baker-Tilly (energy development consultants)
 - Large energy users
 - ► Anyone that would need to be involved in a development project

Tip: everyone was invited to attend by a written letter from Tribal Chief

- ▶ Day 1 All day meeting with all Key Stakeholders Group + Core Team
 - Welcome and Introductions by Tribal Chief
- ▶ Day 2 -
 - Morning: Tribal Council + Core Team
 - Afternoon: Core Team

Our Strategic Energy Plan

<u>Vision Statement</u>: Maximize economic benefits and quality of life for the Mississippi Band of Choctaw Indians through responsible, efficient, and strategic energy development and use

- Energy Efficiency: audits, workforce training, replacement plan, new building codes
- 2. <u>Transit Authority</u>: replacement plan, natural gas conversion study
- 3. Renewable Energy: select pilot project
- 4. Heating: explore natural gas service expansion
- Operations: develop energy usage database, hire Energy Manager
- 6. Other: review existing & proposed new energy contracts

Tips for Success

- Select a Senior-Level Coordinator
- Select a Core Team that has the Knowledge and Enthusiasm
- Involve elected officials
- Involve key stakeholders that represent all important components
- Create a sense of urgency
- Get your plan formally adopted by the Tribe
