FEATURED COMMUNITY: VILLAGE OF SOLOMON Going back home

BY THE KAWERAK ENERGY PROGRAM

The Village of Solomon is located approximately 34 miles east of Nome, on the Nome-Council Highway. Originally settled by Inupiat o the Fish River Tribe, the original village site was on the beach near th sea at the mouth of the Solomon River Delta. After a flood in the earl 1900's, the village relocated to Jerusalem Hill, its present location. Th Cold Rush brought thousands of folks to the region, and Solomon grew into a large town. After storms and flu epidemics of the 1910's. little remained of the community. In 1940, a school was built by the Bureau of Indian Affairs, although it was closed by 1956, followed by the post office closing in 1958. After that, families began to relocate t Nome, Anchorage, and other places so their children could continue 'chool. Now, members of the Village of Solomon are ready for their "t move: going back home. Continued on Page 3.

ENVIRONMENTAL MITIGATION Money from Volkswagen Settlement brings new equipment to communities

What do Volkswagen cars have to do with old dump trucks? Well., in 2015, the car maker Volkswagen was charged with cheating on diesel emissions tests, and had to pay up. That money was set aside to clean up dirty diesels around the nation, including large trucks and heavy equipment in Alaska Native villages.

The Native Villages of White Mountain, Brevig Mission, Savoonga and Koyuk have all submitted paperwork and project plans to get four brand new dump trucks delivered to their communities. How can your community get on the list to receive funds? Read more inside.
