Nature Nook




Eastern Bluebird

(Sialia sialis)

- One of three species of bluebirds in North America
- Population declines are being reversed
- Important predator of destructive insects such as grasshoppers, caterpillars, crickets, katydids, and beetles

The Nature Nook is a regular feature of the community meeting and highlights flora and fauna that inhabit the Fernald Preserve. Bluebirds are utilizing several nest boxes on the Fernald property.





Manage DOE's post-closure responsibilities and ensure the protection of human health and the environment.

The Office of Legacy Management's mission.



The Fernald Preserve's safety performance, as well as Legacy Management's safety performance, continues to be better than industry standards.



- Groundwater pumping rate 2009 to date is 105 percent of design
- Groundwater treatment will continue as necessary to meet discharge limits
- Pumping will be shut down for 30 days (May–June)
- Pump-and-treat operations will continue as necessary to meet regulatory commitments



The aquifer cleanup, which involves pumping and treating water from the aquifer, is progressing as planned. Groundwater modeling projects that aquifer cleanup will be completed in 2026. To date, over 9.82 billion gallons of groundwater have been treated since 1993.

- Ecological monitoring of wetlands
- Invasive species control

The ecological restoration of the Fernald Preserve is ongoing. New trails have been constructed, wetland mitigation is being monitored, and invasive species are being controlled. The recently completed Hickory and Sycamore Trails were opened to the public last fall.

Sampling

2009

- OSDF leak detection monitoring at 42 locations
- Groundwater sampling at 140 locations
- Surface water sampling at 21 locations
- Treated effluent sample at one location
- Air particulate monitoring at six locations
- Direct radiation monitoring at 11 locations
- Sediment sampling at two locations in the Great Miami River
- Continuing approved semiannual, quarterly, and daily sampling

Routine environmental monitoring is conducted to ensure the continued effectiveness of the site's cleanup. The current monitoring program includes sampling groundwater, surface water, treated effluent, and sediment.



Controlled burns are necessary for the health and growth of the prairies at the Fernald site.



Since the Visitors Center opened, the Community Meeting Room has been used by schools, conservation organizations, hikers, and cyclists.
